CITY COUNCIL—OFFICIAL.

REGULAR MEETING.

CITY HALL, NEW ORLEANS, Tuesday, February 20, 1877. The Council met this day at twelve o'clock M., in regular session.

Present—Hon. Ed. Pillsbury, Mayor, presiding, and Administrators Brown, Denis, Diamond, Edwards, McCaffrey and Rongtorff.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved and their reading dispensed with.

Financial Business on Final Passage. Mr. Brown called up the following ordinance, which, having been read twice at the last meeting, were now on their third reading, and they passed unanimously, the yeas and nays having been called:

1. An ordinance providing for the payment of the several accounts therein named, beginning "W. J. Kelly," and amounting to \$1299.

Reports of Committees. By Mr. McCaffrey, and adopted: Unfavorably on petition of "J. C. Mar-

mon, for lease of ground on Canal street, between tracks of Mobile railroad and levee," and ground being now used as a part of the steamboat landing.

2. Favorably by resolution on petition of "property owners on St. Charles avenue," recommending adoption of resolution for the construction of a shell road in lieu of the present pavement.

3. On the notice of James Andrews & Co., agents for J. B. Eads, of their intention to return dredgeboats Nos. 1 and 4, the Administrator has directed that said boats be landed at Algiers, and offers a resolution ordering the sale of the same, as the keeping of them in repair, etc., is too expensive.

4. Also, in answer to advertisement inviting sealed proposals for the cleaning of Chaliborne canal, from Orleans to Elysian Fields street, and the bid of Denis Cronan for \$1280 being the lowest, recommends the adoption of the resolution accepting the same.

By Mr. Rongtorff and adopted: Unfavorably on the petition of C. Montair for reduction of assessment.

Ordinance read and Resolutions Offered. By Mr. McCaffrey and adopted: 1. Resolution authorizing the Administrator of Improvements to advertise ten days for sealed proposals for the construction of a shell road on the Nicolson pavement on St. Charles avenue from Octavia street to Louisiana avenue.

2. Resolution authorizing the Administrator of Improvements to advertise for sealed proposals for the purchase of dredgeboats Nos. 1 and 4.

3. Resolution accepting bid of Denis Cronan to clean out Chaliborne canal from Orleans to Elysian Fields street for \$1280.

By Mr. Rongtorff, and adopted: Resolution authorizing the Administrator of Police to provide two more wagons for the removal of the sick to the hospital, etc.

By Mr. Diamond and adopted: Ordinance directing the judges of the Municipal Police Court to report on Monday of each week to the Administrator of Police all moneys collected by them during the preceding week. Said report shall be in the following form, and each and every person from whom money has been collected in the shape of fines, fees, forfeitures of bonds and disposal of the prisoners, the date and nature of offenses, penalties imposed and other matters, and the report shall be carefully preserved by the Administrator of Police. The Administrator of Police shall certify to the Administrator of Public Accounts the amount of moneys received by him during the preceding week, and the Administrator of Finance on the receiving warrant of the Administrator of Public Accounts, approved, \$100.
