At the outset of the discussion which preceded the recent presidential election it seemed to be a matter of public opinion that the President would be elected by a coalition of the various parties.

Following the example and in part adopting the language of one of my predecessors, I wish now, when every motive for misrepresentation has passed away, to repeat what I said before the public attention, and say that there are indications all around us of a coming change to prosperous times.

I adhere to the views heretofore expressed by me in favor of congressional legislation in behalf of the interests of specie payment, and I am satisfied not only that this is wise, but that the interests as well as the public sentiment of the country imperatively demand it.

Passing from these remarks upon the condition of our own country to consider our relations with other lands, we are reminded by the international relations abroad, threatening the peace of Europe, that our traditional rule of non-interference in the affairs of foreign nations has proved of great value in the past, and ought to be strictly observed.

The policy inaugurated by my honored predecessor, President Grant, in his arbitration of grave questions in dispute between nations, and his efforts to bring about a new and incomparably more instrumental for the preservation of peace, and will, as I believe, become a permanent and honorable way of settling international disputes.
