LOUISVILLE. Capture of Counterfeiters. LOUISVILLE, Oct. 3.—The United States authorities have information that a large gang of counterfeiters, who have been operating in the mountains, have been captured. Five men are now under arrest on the route, and stolen horses and committed other depredations. There are about one hundred well armed and well mounted warriors and one hundred and fifty squaws and children in the party.
