PARTY SPIRIT AND DEMOCRATIC USAGES.

[Extract from the address of the Democratic Young Men's State Convention of New York, recently held at Utica.]

"With objects in their nature so important before us, the necessity of our perfect union, as a party, need hardly be adverted to. Past experience in language that cannot be misunderstood, urges the folly of departing from established usages; the impossibility of preserving an ascendancy without a regard to party discipline. The spirit of party in itself is indispensable to the existence of a popular government. Those who disbelieve it have but slightly scanned the pages of history, and display little knowledge in the nature of man. Where but in a republican government is a spirit of party to be found? Not among the slaves and satraps of despotism, where the mind enchained never struggles to soar, and no dreams of liberty ever disturb the bondman's slumbers; not in courts, where liberty of thought is rare, and liberty of speech a crime; not where the press is muzzled, and the diffusion of knowledge forbidden; party spirit there, watched by a thousand spies, lurks like a guilty thing, and whispers its rebellious murmurs in secret places. Regarded as the smouldering spark which, when blown into a flame, ever consumes tyrants and their institutions, it is seen but to be extinguished. Party spirit grows out of a national hatred of oppression, an inborn spirit of inquiry. It must for ever be, as it ever has been, the companion of a popular government: warring against usurpation of power; watchful over every movement of men in office; resisting every semblance of oppression. It is at once a check upon ambition, and a stirring excitement to emulation; keeping the rewards of public favor open to the most deserving. It nourishes public spirit; it contributes to the choice of moderate measures, and prevents the accumulation of inordinate power. Such is party spirit; but its high purposes are never accomplished without the aid of party discipline. To ensure great results, there must be unanimity of action; to preserve unanimity, there must be sacrifice of opinion. Where every artisan acts independently of his neighbor; where each jarring opinion is advanced with parental obstinacy by its author; where each one deems it his duty to follow his own views, the action of party is paralyzed, and defeat is certain. It is thus that a decided majority is sacrificed to discord and the many governed by the few.

"Acting upon such considerations, the democratic party must be, as it should be, predominant. Composing within itself the majority of the American people, and strictly adhering to its principle of regular nominations, it has been assailed by every combination of party without success, and has triumphed over every species of opposition. During the panic of 1834, the democratic party was proscribed; every engine that wealth could furnish or influence command, was put in motion. The various inducements of fear, cupidity and ambition, were called into action; the poor man was driven from employment; the ties of friendly intercourse were severed; but the result proved the truth of those observations. The great object for which we contend being ascertained, all minor considerations should be subordinate. Concentrating to one purpose all his energies, the republican will not be swayed by the whispers of vanity or the suggestions of interest. Recollecting that he is a laborer for the people, his whole strength will be given to the common cause. Thus unanimity is preserved, which of itself is success. It is only when unfaithful to themselves that the people are defeated."
