The County Register should not only certify that there is no incumbrance on the mortgaged premises, but also, that the totle appears of record, to be vested in the mortgager, and that he is satisfied such is the fact. Nothing short of a rigid adherence to the law on the part of all concerned, can restore public confidence in our banking institutions, or protect the people against imposition or fraud. No plea of ignorance will be permitted as an excuse for a palpible violation of law. The interest and honor of the state, as well as of the banks, imperiously demand that every officer having any duty to perform under the General Banking Law should discharge it with fidelity, this the Bank Commissioners will at least endeavor to do; and for the information of all concerned, and that there may be no just cause of complaint herefore, lot it be distinctly understood, that every institution that does not, within 90 days from and after the 10th of January last, bring itself, in every respect, within the requirements of the general banking law, will be premptly wound up and not suffered any longer to disgrace such as comply with the law.
