

INTERESTING ITEMS.

A beautiful bird was recently caught in Dinwiddie county, Va. It is about twice the size of a common partridge, with back and wings of a handsome brown color—the breast like a dove's, and legs, which are long, of a greenish hue; but the head and bill are the most striking parts, and hard to describe.

The new professorship in Princeton Seminary to which President Aiken has been called is entitled "The Professorship of Christian Ethics and Apologetics." The endowment of it was an unfulfilled purpose of the late Stephen Colwell, Esq., of Philadelphia, and his widow has aided liberally in making up the fund.

In the London Daily Telegraph certain villas at Teddington are thus advertised: "Every shade of religious opinion provided for in the neighborhood, from the highest form of æsthetic ceremonial to the simplest phase of religious sentiment."

The Erie canal, which is the principal one in this State, is in width seventy feet, and the least depth of water seven feet. The length of the locks is one hundred feet. The average dimensions of the boats are—length, about ninety six feet; breadth, seventeen feet three inches; depth of hold, nine feet; they carry an average of about two hundred and thirty tons; their average draught is, when light, two feet, when loaded to full capacity, six feet. The speed at which the boats are required to be propelled by steam is not less than three miles an hour.

The climate of California embraces all the zones—Temperate, Torrid and Frigid. You can experience them all in six hours. Leaving Arctic cold and snow on the Sierra Nevada, you will see tropical flowers and fruits long before you reach Sacramento. In the winter it is bleak, cold and snowy in Shasta, but mild and balmy in Los Angeles and San Diego.

The statue of Abraham Lincoln, intended for Fairmount Park, Philadelphia, is of bronze, was sculptured by Rogers, and is valued at the sum of \$30,000. It is to be placed on a granite pedestal, designed by Struttors. The entire structure will be thirty-three feet in height, conspicuously placed and visible both on entering and leaving the park.

The Princess Louise, now Lady Thorne, paints beautifully and is also a sculptor. Eight of her pictures have been exhibited in London this season, and sold for the benefit of the hospitals. Some pieces of her sculpture have also been exhibited in London.

The Princess Frederica, eldest daughter of ex-King George of Hanover, is dying of poison communicated to her blood by dropping a lighted green taper on her arm Christmas day 1863, while preparing a Christmas tree for some poor children.
