lease thereon and for repairs done thereon by him, for which amount the said Benjamin F. White shall receive in full for all claims held by him against said college: the balance—viz: six thousand dollars—to be used by the State Board of Education in repairing and refitting said college for the objects hereinbefore mentioned.

Sec. 3. Be it further enacted, etc., That this act take effect from and after its passage.

No. 66 An Act

Supplementary to the several acts relating to the town of Franklin, fixing the salary of the Mayor and Councilmen, and granting to said Mayor and Councilmen certain powers.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana in general assembly convened, That hereafter the mayor of the town of Franklin, in the parish of St. Mary, shall be entitled to receive an annual salary of one hundred dollars, and the members of the council of said town shall be entitled to receive each two dollars per diem for each and every day's attendance at the meeting of said council; and the mayor and council are empowered to assess and collect, annually, a sufficient amount of taxes within said town to pay said salary and per diem.

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, etc., That the mayor shall be commissioned by the Governor a justice of the peace, who shall exercise civil and criminal jurisdiction. The said mayor shall preside at all meetings of the town council, and shall call meetings thereof whenever he shall deem it necessary; he shall execute and sustain all laws and ordinances passed by the council, and shall vote only when there is a tie. By virtue of his office he shall have, in order to enforce the laws and ordinances of the council, full and exclusive authority and power to try all offenses against, or violations of, the same, upon a simple rule to show cause immediately, or at such time and place as he may judge proper; to command the town constable, upon a warrant or execution signed by him in his official capacity, to execute his order or judgment, satisfy the same by seizing and exposing for sale, with usual legal delays and formalities, as in ordinary cases, the property real and personal of the person against whom any judgment shall by him have been rendered, or by committing the offender or offenders to jail, as the case may be.

Sec. 3. Be it further enacted, etc., That the constable shall attend the meetings of the council, and execute such summons, warrants or orders as the mayor is authorized to issue, as well as during the recess as during the sittings; and in case the constable is, from any cause, prevented from attending, the mayor may appoint a constable pro tem.

Sec. 4. Be it further enacted, etc., That the mayor and council shall have power to provide for the punishment of vagrants and disorderly persons who may be found, in the day or night time, disturbing the public peace, by fine not to exceed fifty dollars and imprisonment not to exceed forty-eight hours; and in default of paying said fine the party shall be made to work on streets and public works of the corporation, under such regulations as the mayor and council may direct; provided, said party be allowed a reasonable price for his labor while under sentence.

Sec. 5. Be it further enacted, etc., That the mayor shall have power to revoke any license that he may have issued where, from the disorderly, outrageous or improper conduct of the party, the peace and good order of the town may require it; provided, no license shall be so revoked until the party shall have been cited by rule to show cause

why judgment should not be rendered, canceling and revoking said license.

Sec. 6. Be it further enacted, etc., That all laws or parts of laws heretofore passed inconsistent with or contrary to the provisions of this act, be and the same are hereby repealed.

No. 67.

An Act

To incorporate the Francis-Amis Benevolent Association of New Orleans, Louisiana.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana in General Assembly convened, That J. Rey, A. Duhart, O. Augustin, L. Henry, Mathieu, E. Robert, J. J. Monette, W. Joubert, F. J. Delhomme, D. Deruise, Edgard, Thezan, O. Bart, Henry Favelin, L. Pelissier, J. Sarros, and such other persons as are or who may become members of said association, are hereby erected and constituted, in name and fact, a body corporate and politic, under the name and style of Francis-Amis Benevolent Association of New Orleans, Louisiana, for the object and purpose of creating and perpetuating a charitable association; they shall be capable in law to purchase, receive, hold, lease, sell, or otherwise acquire or alienate real or personal estate; shall have a common seal, and may change and alter the same at pleasure, and by said corporate name may sue and be sued; provided, that the lands so held or acquired for the proper uses, purposes and behoof of said association; and provided further that all real estate owned by said association; shall be exempt from State, parish and municipal taxation. Said corporation shall have, under the above title, a perpetual succession of officers and members; it shall have full power to make and adopt all by-laws and regulations it may deem fit and proper for its government, and to modify, amend and change the same; provided said by-laws and regulations are not contrary to the Constitution and laws of this State and of the United States of America.

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, etc., That the officers of this association shall consist of a president, a vice president, secretary, assistant secretary treasurer and orator, who shall be chosen by the majority of members.

Sec. 3. Be it further enacted, etc., That all power of the association is placed in the president thereof who shall have the right to sue and be sued in behalf of said society.

Sec. 5. Be it further enacted, etc., That this act shall take effect from and after its passage.

An Act

To amend an act entitled An Act to authorize the compilation of a new and official map of the State.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana, in General Assembly convened, That section second of an act entitled An Act to authorize the compilation of a new and official map of the State, No. 166, approved October 20, 1868, be so amended and re-enacted as to read as follows: That the special engineer thus created shall receive compensation for his services rendered to the State at the rate of two hundred dollars per month, from the date of his appointment up to the completion of the work on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one.

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, etc., That this act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

No. 69.

An Act

Granting to Mrs. Louisa F. Collins, of the parish of Pointe Coupee, the right of keeping a ferry across the Atchafalaya river, at the mouth of Bayou Coville.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana in general assembly convened, That Mrs. Louisa F. Collins, her heirs or assigns, shall, subject to the terms and conditions hereafter expressed, have and enjoy the exclusive privilege of keeping a ferry across the Atchafalaya river, on both sides, at the mouth of Bayou Coville, in the parish of Avoyelles, for the term of ten years.
