Mr. J. W. Walker moved that the sum of ten dollars each for the chairman and clerk for extra services rendered be added to said report, and that the report as amended be adopted, and the accounts allowed as recommended by the committee, which prevailed, a majority of the members elect voting therefor.

The Committee on Claims made the following report and on motion of Mr. Roberts the same was adopted: To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Kent County:

GENTLEMEN—The matter of the claim of Stephen Clonon, Theodore G. Houck, Kinneum Randall and Isaac Tower for bounties claimed to be due, having been referred to your Committee on Claims, we would respectfully report as follows:

Stephen Clonon claims \$200.00 for re-enlisting as a veteran in the Third Michigan Infantry Volunteers. Under resolution of the Board of Supervisors passed January 14, 1864, a bounty of \$200.00 was offered to all members of that regiment who re-enlisted at Brandy, Va., December, 1863. This claimant re-enlisted in said regiment February 3, 1864. On January 14th, Col. Pierce, who was in command of the regiment, telegraphed from Chattanooga, asking the following question: "Will veterans re-enlisting here be entitled to bounty offered by Kent county?" and the following answer was returned: "No, quote full and more low." (See proceedings of the Board of Supervisors, January 14, 1864). The claimant not re-enlisting until February 3, 1864, could not come under the resolution of the board, as the board limited the number of re-enlistments to 125, and more than that number had re-enlisted prior to the time of the re-enlistment of the claimant, and for the further reason that he did not re-enlist until February 3, 1864.

Theodore Houck claims \$150.00 for re-enlisting as a veteran in the Third Michigan Infantry Volunteers. He claims to have re-enlisted at Brandy, Va., in December, 1863, and under all favorable conditions would have been entitled to the bounty offered by said board to the members of the Third Michigan Infantry, re-enlisting in December, 1863, to the number of 125. But in the resolution the conditions were that the veterans re-enlisting were at the time of their original enlistment, residents of Kent county; and also claimant must furnish written statements from either the state or federal governments that such veterans re-enlisting were residents of or accredited to Kent county, either upon the call then made or as an excess to be deducted from any further demands. The claimant shows no proof whatever as required by the Board of Supervisors in their resolution.

Kinneum Randall—This claimant claims that he is the only heir of his son, Lafayette Randall, who enlisted December 19, 1861; that Kent county was then offering a bounty of \$100 to men who enlisted in Kent county; that his son died of wounds received at the battle of Stone River, and that his said son never received the bounty. The records of Kent county do not show that the county was offering any bounty at the time of the enlistment of claimant's son; so that claimant cannot be entitled after 1861 thereto, unless there has been some later resolution of the Board offering bounties of \$100, the same to cover prior enlistments, of which resolution we have been unable to find any record.

The claim of Isaac L. Tower is governed by the preceding one. All of which is

Absent—Mr. Kinney. The committee on claims reported back to the board, without recommendation, the claim of Wyoming township of \$356.42 for care of typhoid fever case.

Mr. Havens moved that the claim be allowed as presented. Carried by the following vote, Mr. Frost calling for the yeas and nays: Yeas—Messrs. Colson, Emmons, Fehsenfeld, Frost, Gill, Gould, Havens, Hill, Hogadone, O'Leary, Potter, Plumb, Rosenburg, Skeels, Smith, Smith, Sullivan, Ulrich, David Walker, J. W. Walker, E. C. Woodworth, Chairman—22.

Nays—Messrs. Benjamin, Clements, Colburn, Leppink, Loomis, Proctor, Roberts, Schermerhorn, Sinclair, Ward, W. F. Woodworth—11. Not voting—Messrs. Bergin, Ladner, Watkins—3.

Absent—Mr. Kinney. The same committee reported back to the board without recommendation, the claim of Hiram J. Chambers, county drain commissioner, for services rendered in his official capacity.

Mr. Hill moved that the account be audited and paid out of the proper drain fund, when paid into the county treasury. Carried by vote of 32 yeas and no nays.

The chairman appointed as the other two members of the special committee on vault fixtures Messrs. Sullivan and Skeels.

Mr. Hogadone moved that the chairman and clerk be instructed to draw an order in favor of the janitor, \$4.00 for extra services in taking care of supervisors' room.

Lost by a vote of 13 yeas and 16 nays. Mr. Colson offered the following resolution and moved its adoption, which prevailed unanimously:

Resolved, that we hereby testify our high appreciation of the very able and impartial manner in which our chairman, L. A. Solomon, and our clerk, C. L. Harvey, have performed their duties at the several sessions of this board, during the past year; and for the uniform kindness and courtesy shown us, we hereby tender to them our sincere thanks.

On motion of Mr. Sinclair, Supervisor Kinney was excused from attendance for the day.

Mr. Sullivan offered the following resolution, and moved its adoption, a majority of the members elect voting therefor:

Resolved, that the chairman and clerk of this board be and are hereby authorized and instructed to audit, when presented, the bill of the Grand Rapids Publishing Company, for the publishing of the proceedings of this board for the January session, and pamphlets according to the contract of said publishing company with this board, and draw an order for the payment of the same.

Resolved further, That the clerk be instructed to mail to each supervisor a copy of the proceedings in pamphlet received by him.

On motion of Mr. J. W. Walker, the minutes of to-day's proceedings were read preparatory to adjournment and were approved.

On motion of Mr. Havens, the board adjourned sine die.


