SLASHED WITH A KNIFE.

Charles Miller Makes a Deadly Assault Upon a Companion.

An altercation between John Wilson and Charles Miller came near resulting fatally last evening. They were walking down West Fulton street when an old quarrel was revived. As they reached the corner of Fulton and Waterloo streets Miller surreptitiously jerked a knife from his pocket and slashed Wilson across the thigh, cutting a gash three inches in depth reaching to the bone. Miller immediately took to his heels and succeeded in eluding the officers up to a late hour last night.

Wilson was found sitting on the walk, faint and bleeding profusely. The patrol wagon was summoned and the injured man was taken to police headquarters, where he related the circumstances surrounding the case. He said he and Miller had some trouble a few months ago which resulted in a fist fight. Miller was whipped, and last evening he said he would have revenge. The two men were under the influence of liquor when the trouble occurred last evening. Doctor Kelly, the city physician, was called to attend to Wilson and he was taken to the U. S. A. home for treatment. Both men are single and day laborers. Wilson said he was a carpenter and resided at No. 11 Shoenaker's alley. Descriptions of Miller were sent by the police department to the officials of neighboring towns requesting them to arrest him if seen. A charge of deadly assault has been made against him.
