

GIRL AT A DANCE Causes a Jealous Admirer to Shoot a Rival IN THE NECK WITH A REVOLVER

Probably Fatal Termination of a Fight Commenced at a Tough Dance in Ionia—The Shooter Captured.

Ionia, May 25.—William Cann and George Westall went to the Arbutus dance last night and while there got into a fight over a girl. Westall got decidedly the best of Cann. This morning Westall was in Thomas White's saloon drinking when Cann came in.

On seeing Westall Cann became furious and said he would fix him. Going into Kenyon's hardware store, next door, he purchased a revolver and returning, went up close to Westall and shot him in the neck, the ball lodging in the shoulder. Westall was taken home, but it is not yet known whether the wound will prove fatal. Both men had been drinking heavily. Cann, a cigar maker, employed at Hummel's factory, Cann was captured after a long chase and lodged in jail at noon.

REVERSE TALKS

He Explains His Connection with the Tompkins Suit.

Bay City, May 25.—Orren S. Ryerse, the brother-in-law of Frederick W. Tompkins, who committed suicide yesterday, publicly states today that he is not the best evidence in connection with the affair, evidence that cannot be gained without a medical trial to break up an intrigue that was disgracing the family and bringing odium upon the three young daughters. He tried to avoid publicity, but the parties engaged in the scandal would not promise to discontinue their improper relations. Mr. Ryerse was clerk of one of the senate committees during the last legislative session.

CATHEDRAL SITE PURCHASED.

The Diocese of Detroit to Have a \$500,000 Church.

Detroit, May 25.—Bishop Foley today effected the purchase from Edward L. Parsons of the Philo Parsons property at the corner of Cass avenue and Parsons street, extending from Cass avenue to the Westminster church. This is the site finally selected for the new Roman Catholic cathedral, to cost \$500,000. The property has a frontage of 180 feet on Cass avenue and 600 on Parsons street. The purchase price was \$85,000. It was purchased some years ago by Philo Parsons for a pasture for stock.

It is claimed his right name is Trombly, and that he never was in the army, but managed to get Denny's discharge papers and thus to impersonate him.

What Made Us Sick.

Lansing, May 25.—Reports to the state board of health show rheumatism, neuritis, bronchitis and tonsillitis, in the order named, caused the most sickness in Michigan during the week ending May 21. Diphtheria is reported at forty places, scarlet fever at forty-seven, typhoid fever at eleven and measles at fourteen places. The case of varioloid at Detroit recovered during the week.

Glanders Kills a Man.

Ypsilanti, May 25.—Joseph Dunnebacke bought a horse some time ago suffering from glanders, which in time infected every other horse, cow and pig on the place, even the barn yard fowls contracting it. A week ago Dunnebacke developed symptoms of the disease and after much suffering has died.

Epidemic of Burglaries.

Traverse City, May 25.—An epidemic of petty burglaries seem to have broken out. Several houses have been entered during the last few nights, the amounts taken varying from \$15 to \$100. Two cases reported last night, with several unsuccessful attempts.

Madison, Wis., May 23.—A man named Bachmann threw himself in front of the west-bound fast mail train on the St. Paul road at Portage Tuesday night, and was instantly killed. His body was mangled beyond recognition. Family trouble was the cause of the suicide.

Died on the Stage.

Palm, May 23.—During the rehearsal of the new comic opera "Soylla" at the Theater d'Application, a young actress, the wife of the tenor who plays the hero of the piece, fell dead on the stage. The husband is prostrated with grief, the piece has been postponed and the greatest consternation seized all present.

Chicago, May 23.—While a dance was in progress at the residence of John H. Gordon, 1843 Wolf road, Sunday, James Gordon dropped dead in her partner's arms. The festivities were being given in honor of the unfortunate woman's six birthday.
