An Alpena Woman's Unhappy Affliction. QUEER AND STRANGE MALADY

Which Baffles the Physicians—She Sleeps Much and is Particular About Her Diet—Other State News.

ALPENA, Mich., June 30.—The friends of Miss Kinney, of this city, have decided to send her to the northern part of the state in the hope that she may be benefited if not cured, of a peculiar and distressing malady. The history of her sickness is one of interest to medical men. Five years ago she was as healthy as any girl of her age. One afternoon she complained of a severe headache and went to her room. She ate her supper and nothing unusual was thought of her complaints until breakfast time came and she did not put in an appearance with the family. On going to her room she was found walking up and down the floor, her eyes staring and vacant and arms outstretched, as if to ward off some approaching danger. What had occurred during the night no one ever knew. Perhaps there was some terrible fright, whose deep impression five years have been unable to remove from her mind.

Doctors Called to Her Aid. Physicians were called, but were unable to correctly diagnose her ailment. All attempts to cure or benefit the patient were useless, and they soon gave up all hope. For two years, when hungry, she would make a peculiar noise and occasionally speak a few words. Since then, for the last three years, she has never spoken or opened her eyes, as far as her parents know. When she wakes anything she makes it known by signs. Her mother has attended her so long that she knows almost intuitively what she wants.

As regards her food she is very changeable. For several weeks this last spring she ate nothing but potatoes; then sweet milk entirely, while for the last month she has taken nothing but sour milk. Her mother, when the girl is in bed, asks if she is hungry. She is always answered by a nod or shake of the head.

If the answer is in the affirmative she gets what she wants in the habit of eating and placing it on a stand at the head of the bed, leaves the room. The girl then helps herself to the food, but never while any one is in the room. Her mother is the only one she pays any attention to. No strangers are noticed at all. She lays in an apparent sleep from which it is impossible to fully arouse her from one year's end to the other.

A peculiar feature of the case is that she has been out of her mind but a short time. At the first she was delirious, but since then she has to all appearances been in her right mind. The physicians of this city say they can never recover, and all agree in pronouncing it one of the most remarkable cases on record.
