

RUINED BY THE RAIN

Yesterday's Races Had to Be Declared Off.

ENTRIES FOR MONDAY'S RACES

There Will Be Five Races, Including the Great Handicap Steeplechase Over the Entire Course.

Loud, general and persistent cursing was indulged in yesterday morning when the sporting fraternity awoke and found the sky heavily overcast with clouds. The more hopeful ones thought it would stop raining after it began before noon and relied on the track to do the rest in case the elements decided that a let up would be the proper thing. The weather, however, had it in for the races, and at 11 o'clock it was evident that they would have to be declared off. This was done, much to the disgust of the riders, one of whom said: "Kind of a day to be out of sight at Washington park. Day can't wait for the sun every time they run a horse race."

The management, however, felt that the weather would keep the crowd away, although the condition of the track would have permitted the race to be run. Accordingly it was declared off and the jockeys came back to the city to enjoy themselves for the rest of the day. The Morton house was a seething mass of horsemen and horse fanciers all the afternoon. They played pool for recreation and rehearsed the Chicago races.

Both Associations Hopeful. The rain was a most unfortunate thing for both tracks. George Starr was somewhat dependent and feared the Monday trotting race would have to be declared off if the rain did not stop before morning. The south track is in lighter soil, and the members of the club thought it would dry all right if the rain ceased before Monday morning. 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
