

LOST IN THE RIVER

John Moden Drowned Near Belmont Yesterday

WHILE BATHING IN THE RIVER

He Could Not Swim, and Was Swept Away in Spite of All the Efforts to Save Him.

John Moden, a cabinet maker aged 23 years and boarding with George Heers at No. 681 Turner street, was drowned yesterday afternoon in Grand river north of the Soldiers' home. He, with John and Frank Hopkins, of No. 573 Turner street, and Charles Fritz went Saturday morning to visit a party of friends that were camping on the river bank just below Plainfield. In the afternoon Fritz, the Hopkins and Moden went in bathing near a point called "Stony riff." Moden, not being able to swim, remained on a sandbar where the water was about four feet deep, but the bar sloped abruptly to the stream. The remainder of the party struck out into deep water and were swimming up stream. Fritz gave an alarm to John Hopkins that Moden was in deep water and needed help. Hopkins returned and when he reached Moden he found him grasped with Fritz, who had gone to his rescue. The two had gone to the bottom and Hopkins dived after him. He lifted them to the surface and Fritz released himself from the death grasp of Moden, and being nearly exhausted started for the shore. Hopkins was nearly tired out by his previous efforts to swim up stream, and his strength was nearly gone when he went to the drowning man's assistance. In his efforts to save him he went down a second time and was unable to rise. He crept along on the bottom of the river until he reached shallow water and succeeded in getting out.

Hopkins Was Exhausted. In relating the circumstances last evening Hopkins was so nearly exhausted when he reached Moden that he was not able to give much assistance, and came very nearly being drowned himself. When he reached shallow water after having crawled along on the bottom he saw nothing more of Moden. He had gone down the last time and was drowned. Boats were procured and a search was instituted for the body, but without success. There is a strong under current in the river a short distance from the sloping sand bar on which Moden was standing and it is thought he walked out too far and was drawn under. Those who were searching for the body continued until midnight when they abandoned their work with the belief that it had been swept down the river by the strong current. Moden was a single man and had been employed by the Grand Rapids School Furniture company. He leaves a widowed mother who was nearly prostrated when she was informed of the accident. He was a good workman and was highly respected by all his associates. The news of the drowning was reported to Sheriff McQueen by a telegraph message from Daniel Davey, deputy game warden at Belmont, and sheriff, but his services were not needed last night.
