

MET AN AWFUL END

E. Hubbel, a C., S. & M. Fireman Killed While

LEANING OUT OF A CAB WINDOW

Near Fosters—His Body Was Terribly Mangled and His Bones Were Scattered Along the Truck.

SAGINAW, Mich., July 17.—E. Hubbel, a fireman on the Cincinnati, Saginaw & Mackinaw, met with a terrible death near Fosters, south of this city. He was leaning out of the cab when his head struck a bridge, knocking him off and dragging him some distance. His body was terribly mangled, his brains being scattered in all directions. The train ran a mile before the engineer missed the fireman. It was then run back and the remains taken to Durand. Deceased was 22 years old and leaves a father and mother at Smith's Creek, St. Clair county.

CUNNING CROOK CAUGHT

With Tooth Mechanic's Tools in His Clothes.

MARSHALL, Mich., July 17.—A few nights ago Spear's dental parlors at Battle Creek were burglarized of about sixty dollars' worth of tools. Before the news reached here Dr. Smith had purchased a lot of the instruments of a smooth stranger who claimed they belonged to his wife's brother who had just died. Sheriff Prentiss today while at the depot waiting for Dr. Spear to arrive spotted a man who answered the man's description, engaged him in conversation and finally arrested and searched him. He found a great collection of skeleton keys, burglar tools and stolen articles. The man goes by the name of H. T. Flaner and is wanted in Oakland and another county, there being \$200 reward offered for him on similar charges. Sheriff Prentiss had just offered \$50 reward for him and had already telegraphed and started the printing of circulars.

YOUNG PEOPLE ADJOURN.

Addresses Delivered—Officers Elected for the Coming Year.

DETROIT, July 17.—The last day of the Baptist Young People's union was opened with a prayer meeting at 9:30 a. m., led by C. J. Spencely of Boston. Many of the pupils of the city were filled by distinguished pastors in attendance at the convention. A praise service, conducted by the Rev. W. E. Witter of Des Moines, Ia., began the afternoon session. Four addresses followed: "Young People and Stewardship of Money," by the Rev. J. B. Gambrell, D. D., of Meriden, Miss.; "Young People and Systematic Benevolence," by the Rev. R. D. Thomas, D. D., of Toronto; "Young People and Home Missions," by the Rev. Lansing Burrows, D. D., of Augusta, Ga.; and "Young People and Foreign Missions," by the Rev. R. C. Maline, D. D., of Boston, Mass. Greetings were extended to the missionaries present, and then an adjournment was taken till 7:30 p. m.

Following are the officers of the union for the ensuing year: President—L. L. Henson, Baltimore, Md. Secretary—M. G. McLeod, Omaha, Neb.

General Secretary—F. L. Wilkins, D. D., Chicago.

After some discussion \$3,200 was appropriated for the salary of the secretary of the board of managers. It was unanimously agreed to locate the executive committee in Chicago, and the following from that city were elected: W. M. Lawrence, J. Nevells, P. S. Jensen, J. M. Price, O. P. Gifford, J. H. Chapman, M. B. Hurlburt, W. G. Shearer, Jesse L. Baldwin.

The place of meeting for next year was left to the discretion of the executive committee, invitations having been received from Indianapolis, Chicago, Omaha and several southern cities. The evening session opened with a praise service conducted by the Rev. Emery Hunt of Toledo, O. Three resolutions were then offered and adopted. The first denouncing the liquor traffic, the second returning thanks to all who aided in making the convention a success and in helping the delegates enjoy their visit; and the third a resolution of recognition by the union of the great work done by foreign missionaries since the first one was sent out, just 100 years ago. The president's address on the new year before the union was delivered by John H. Chapman of Chicago, after which Wayland Hoyt, D. D., of Minneapolis, preached the convention sermon. A testimony and enlistment service led by the Rev. Frank L. Wilkins, D. D., the general secretary, lasted an hour or so longer, and the convention finally adjourned at 10:30. A great many of the delegates left for home during the day.

NEWAYGO, Mich., July 17.—W. W. Saunders has died from injuries received in a fight June 29. A post-mortem showed that injuries to spinal chord was the cause of his death. Fred C. Taylor is under arrest for the crime and will be examined tomorrow.

Collared for Stealing Clothes.

ANY ARBOR, July 17.—Last evening a valuable grip belonging to D. S. Covert of Chicago was stolen from the Toledo, Ann Arbor & Northern Michigan depot. It was found in a freight car with its contents scattered. The thief, who gave his name as Charles F. Kane of Pennsylvania, was caught with some of the clothes on his person. He waived examination before Justice Pond and was bound over to the circuit court. In default of \$1,000 bail he was committed to jail.

Disappointed Girl Takes Iodine.

DETROIT, July 17.—Lilly Brown, a pretty brunette, 18 years of age, living at No. 172 Randolph street, swallowed a dose of tincture of iodine during the absence of her mother and had a narrow escape from death. Five weeks ago Frank Kellhofer, the accepted suitor of Miss Brown, died and that since that time the young woman has been moody and unusually quiet.

Farmer Badly Hurt.

JACKSON, Mich., July 17.—Yesterday Fred Fruhard, who was driving a reaper, stopped the machine and went in front to repair the gears, when the horses suddenly started. He was knocked down and the machine passed over him, cutting two gashes in his right leg and one in his left. His arms and body were badly cut. He was very badly hurt.

KALAMAZOO, Mich., July 17.—The Kalamazoo Casket company's works were damaged to the extent of \$3,500 by fire. Insurance \$2,600.

MONROE, Mich., July 17.—Fire partially destroyed the residence of Herbert Stoddard, causing a loss of \$8,000; no insurance.

Penitential Paragraphs.

Adlai E. Stevenson, who with several other democrats will take an involuntary trip up Salt river next November, stopped at Jackson on his way to the home of Grover the Fat long enough to buy a piece of raspberry pie and receive an ovation from three citizens and a newspaper reporter. Charles Gilbert of Amands, Macomb county, met with a peculiar and painful accident. While unloading hay the rope caught in his hand and stripped the flesh all off his four fingers. The hand may have to be amputated.

Marcus Tuttle of Saginaw is suffering from aphasia, a rare and peculiar disease which is defined to be "the loss of the power of speech or the appropriate use of words, the vocal organs remaining intact and the intelligence preserved."

While David Herrand, a well digger, was engaged at his calling about five miles north of Mio a buckshot became detached from the pulley above and fell a distance of seventy feet, striking him on the head and instantly killing him.

Edward Shipley of Saginaw has sued the Saginaw Union Street Railway company for \$20,000 because the conductor of an electric car pushed his elbow through a window, sending a piece of glass into Shipley's ear, causing deafness.

At Muskegon Edward Maloney, a sailor, during the prevalence of a hurricane, saved the Cheaney Ames from foundering after a hole had been cut in her by jamming overboard and covering the hole with lard paper.

George Herald, a compass man of the Lake Superior survey, while attempting to board a train at Witbeck missed his footing and had both of his legs cut off at the knees. He died shortly after in horrible agony.


