WHEELMEN AT WASHINGTON.

The Visions Being Handsomely Entertained—Etries for the Races.

WASHINGTON, July 18.—During the next few days the eyes of the cycling world will be centered upon this city, for during that time will be held the thirteenth annual reunion of the League of American Wheelmen which, from all appearances, will be the most successful in its history. There have arrived already about 2,000 cyclists, including the women, of whom there are about 300. The splendid opportunity offered by Washington with its asphalt is taken advantage of and a very large attendance is expected. The races will be a great card during the meeting. The track is clay and is said to be very fast. There will not be any records broken, however, as the fastest mile ever made over it was in 2:40 and the record in 2:10, but it is expected that 2:20 will be made. This forenoon the wheelmen, accompanied by members of the local clubs, visited all of the executive departments and also look several runs to points of interest about the city. This afternoon the visitors met at the club house of the Columbia Athletic club and several entertainments were given in honor of the visitors. The races begin tomorrow and continue on Wednesday. Hotel Del Coronado.

The city is bounded on the west by the waters of the Pacific and rises gradually from the water level to a high plateau, which is ascended by a cable line of street cars. The choice residence portion is built on a high hill overlooking the bay. Opposite San Diego, on a peninsula, lies Coronado, with its handsome, world-famed Hotel Del Coronado. This hotel is in itself a wonder in size and in its perfect arrangements. It has all its departments there in a beautiful and complete manner. On our arrival at the queenly spot Mayor Sherman gave the welcome address to the journalists. It was delivered feelingly and distinctly, in beautiful language, and on the most beautiful spot in the extreme southern part of California.

Coronado, "the garden of delight," is adorned with flowering plants and shrubs along its surf-beaten shores. There are also other sights of great interest, among them the ostrich farm. This is a sight worth seeing and where we passed half an hour of instructive pleasure. Then came the fine botanical gardens and a highly interesting and instructive museum. They are educational to all, and may take time to visit and become interested in them. There are over 12,000 specimens of natural curios on exhibition.

MORE OF THE WEST

Prof. Swensberg Contributes Another Chapter

ON THE BEAUTIES OF THE COAST

From Barstow Through to San Diego and Other Points of Great Natural Beauty—The Railroads.

Barstow is located on the southern border of the Mojave desert, at the junction of the South Pacific, Atlantic Pacific and South California railroads. It is a distributing point for a large section of mining country, but has no agricultural or manufacturing interests. Its chief claim to notice lies in the fact that it is the initial station on the line of the Southern California railway, a part of the Santa Fe system, so ably conducted and efficient in its operation. From this point we are taken over the California road, which runs southwest from Barstow, through the Cajan pass of the San Bernardino mountains. It reaches an altitude of 3,819 feet to their summit, the highest point on the line. From this point the train descends quite rapidly. The scenery is striking, at places extremely interesting, and the effect most wonderful. These mountains, though comparatively unexplored, are said to contain a great variety of minerals, including iron, tin, gold and silver. The observant traveler will notice some great feats of engineering through the Cajan pass.

At Highland, the junction point, with a belt line running east, along the foot-hills to East Highland and Mentone, runs a portion of the famous kite-shaped track of the Santa Fe & Southern California. This runs through Redland and joins the main line at San Bernardino. While en route along the road, belongs much of the credit. He is a thoroughly affable gentleman, always looking to the wants of his passengers, and judging from what we heard and saw he was a universal favorite with the excursionists because of his gentlemanly manners. All the employees tried their best to make the journey one of the pleasantest ever taken, and to them we owe gratitude. The scenery along this route is surprisingly beautiful. San Bernardino.

We passed over the Atlantic & Pacific, the Southern Pacific and Southern California, which contributed their part in the delightful closing scenery to this point.

Mr. Prescott of Highland, with business headquarters at San Bernardino, superintendent of machinery and car departments, was on the train with us and saw well to his part of the work as to our safety and comfort. Mr. Prescott showed every attention and courtesy to the passengers, calling attention to sights of interest, and explained them as we went. He at one time occupied a like position with the Grand Trunk in Michigan with headquarters at Port Huron.

We will continue our trip from this point northward and hope that THE HERALD'S readers may form some idea of the country.

San Bernardino is one of the old California towns. It was first settled by Mormon colonists in 1831, but its growth as a city dates from 1886—the year in which direct rail connection with the east was formed with the Santa Fe.

Mount San Bernardino is 12,600 feet high, and Mount San Antonio (Old Baldy) 10,142 feet high.

The Stewart hotel was built at a cost of \$150,000. They have large irrigating enterprises here. San Bernardino county produces more oranges than any other county in the United States. There are now planted 2,275,000 orange trees, of lemon trees 180,000, and many other species.
