Esting papers were read by George Kiddle of the Kalamazoo Telegraph on "The Pursuit of News Under Difficulties," and by Mrs. Dr. Kellogg of Battle Creek on "The Effect of Journalism on Woman and Her Home Life."

These papers were able and freely discussed. Your correspondent was called on to address the association and was heartily received by this most excellent and intellectual body of women.

We had little idea that the women of the press of Michigan were so numerous and so thoroughly alive to newspaper interests. An experience meeting was held after adjournment in Evelyn hall, which was unique and intensely interesting.

It would be interesting reading if each experience could be given, but space forbids the mention of each in detail.

The experiences, however, showed the tact and push of woman and the necessity for her presence in journalism. One heroic looking little woman gave an experience that would have dazzled even the most chivalric. Her husband died, and the paper was left on her hands with no experience and no extra money.

She bought a dictionary, walked into the office, took hold of the business and editorial management herself, and by a most precious paper with a good circulation. One lady rocked the cradle with one hand and wrote copy with the other. Other experiences were equally interesting, and this scribe felt highly honored on being permitted to hear them.

We have nothing but the best compliments for the woman's press association of Michigan. Their presence in lifting journalism to a higher and purer standard will be hailed with delight.

Five drops of brandy in a teaspoonful of water may be given every ten or fifteen minutes; but if the vomiting persists give this brandy in equal parts of milk and lime-water.

Entries for the Stallion Stakes Close Today. PREPARATIONS FOR THE RACES

Every Indication That the "Furniture City Meeting" Will Mark an Era in Trotting.

The Horseman's association has received a letter from W. C. Jones, the president of the Columbus Driving Park association of Columbus, Tenn., stating that he will leave Columbus on August 1 for this city with his string of flyers and asking that stalls be reserved for him.

Among the entries for the 2:30 pace for the \$3,000 stake, are Robert J, record 2:16; Atlantic King, 2:19; Ira King, 2:24; Flying Jib, 2:31, just made at the Detroit track; Cleveland 8, the celebrated stallion also entered in this race, has in the last few days shown his ability to pace a mile in 2:15 on the Common stock track. He will be driven by Amos Rathburn. Sadie H, 2:23, is also entered in this race, and is at present at Cleveland, Ohio, where she is showing great speed and is picked as a sure winner by the talent for the pace there this week.

Among the other fast ones entered for races are Silver Cloud, owned by S. M. Clement of Colma, Mich., for the 2:35 trot and Harry Noble for the 2:15 trot.

Although the entries for the stallion stake close Monday night, the full list cannot be made up until late in the week, as entries mailed before the date of closing will be accepted. But with the exception of Allerton it is probable that all the best stallions in America will enter and compete for the great stake.
