NATURE'S CURIOUS ANIMALS
Will Be Exhibited Here by Barnum & Bailey.

Among the very curious living wonders to be seen in the two menageries of Barnum & Bailey's greatest show on earth, which is to exhibit here on Tuesday next, is a group of nature's most gigantic, curious and diminutive specimens of animals.
