

BRINGS A BIG SUIT

William A. Canfield Wants \$25,000 for an

ACCIDENT TO EVA CANFIELD

Wherby Her Skull Was Fractured—He Charges the Street Railway Company With the Responsibility.

William A. Canfield as the next friend of Eva Belle Canfield, has begun a suit in the circuit court against the Consolidated Street Railway company, claiming damages to the amount of \$25,000. The allegations made in the bill of complaint are that Eva Belle Canfield, with her mother, was riding on a wealthy avenue street car on June 15 last, and when at the head of Monroe street she attempted to alight, but before she had reached the ground the car started and she was thrown violently to the pavement. Her forehead struck the brick pavement with such force as to fracture the frontal bone. From the injuries received she was confined to her bed for several weeks, and an expense of \$500 was incurred for medical attendance. It is alleged that the little girl was permanently maimed and will not fully recover from the injuries received. A portion of the frontal bone now protrudes two inches, and her brain is yet affected from the fracture of the skull.

Hoch Arranged for Assault

The examination of Jacob F. Hoch, charged with assault with the intention to commit rape upon Annie Van, a girl under the age of consent, was begun in police court yesterday afternoon. Annie is a daughter of Jennie Van, who has a charge pending against her in police court of keeping a house of ill-fame at No. 14 Island street. The girl was an unwilling witness, and the story of the assault was drawn from her with considerable difficulty by Prosecutor Malcolm. She testified that she was nearly 16 years old when the assault was made, the 25th of July last. Other witnesses said she was 12 years old. The complaint was made under the statute which makes the taking of indecent liberties with a female under the age of 14 years. At the conclusion of the testimony the defendant's attorney, Frank Rodgers, made a motion to dismiss the case on the ground that the girl's age did not come under the statute. Judge Haggerty reserved his decision until Monday, September 5.

Van Houten Was Discharged

A warrant was issued from police court in March last for the arrest of B. A. Van Houten on complaint of Mr. Vander Werp of Vander Werp, Benjamin & Co., charging him with embezzlement. The officers were unable to arrest him until yesterday, when he was produced in court by Deputy Sheriff Pulver. When he was arraigned the evidence showed that he was employed as collector for the complainant's company and that he used \$4 of the amount collected to sample the different grades of whiskey in the city and was unable to replace it. The complainant and the prosecuting attorney thought under the circumstances they would have the case dismissed. The judge granted a motion to that effect.

Preparing the Answer

The papers are being prepared by the city attorney in answer to the complaint filed by Cornelia G. Fuller against the city in regard to the widening of Fulton street, west of Waterloo street. The complaint was filed in the city court on August 25th, and the defendant must show cause why an injunction should not be issued.

Carnegie Receives \$6,853.39

The circuit court jury in the case of Carnegie, Phipps & Co. vs. John C. Holt, returned a verdict shortly before midnight last night, giving the plaintiff a judgment for \$6,853.39. The case was given to the jury at 4 p. m.

A New Topic.

Prof. Dewar, in lecturing before the Royal Institution, London, recently called attention to the audience an entirely new thing in the way of topics, in the shape of a globe filled with liquefied air. The boiling point of liquid air is 192 degrees Centigrade, or 19 degrees lower than that of oxygen. After liquefying oxygen, Prof. Dewar said it is not true, as has been supposed, that the oxygen in the air liquefies before the other elements in the air; on the contrary, the air liquefies as air, and is not resolved into its elements before liquefying. If this globe were cooled down to 180 degrees below the zero of Centigrade it would be covered with a sea of liquefied gas thirty-five feet deep, of which about seven feet would be liquid oxygen.
