If You Are the Police Are After You.

TWO ARRESTED YESTERDAY

Julius Caesar, Jr. and Peter Anderson Come to Grand Jury Trying to Be Acquainted to Two Girls.

Following the recent raid on the female street walkers by the police department comes a determined effort on the part of the officers to clear the streets of an equally despicable class of persons, the male masher. Police officers are out in citizen's clothing each night watching for the latter class. Sunday night Officer Brown saw two young men passing along Canal street who were bowing and raising their hats to young women. They accosted several women who did not return the recognition and the officer suspected all was not as it should be. He inquired of two women whom the fellows had accosted if they were acquainted with them. They informed the officer that the fellows were total strangers to them. The officer arrested the fellows, who proved to be Julius Caesar, Jr., and Peter Anderson, and took them to police headquarters. The young women did not wish to gain notoriety by appearing as complaining witnesses against the young men in court, so the fellows were released. Yesterday it was ascertained that two other girls, who had been similarly accosted by the boys, were willing to appear as witnesses and Caesar and Anderson were arrested and arraigned in police court on a charge of being disorderly. Anderson's examination was set for September 9, and Caesar will be examined this morning. The girls who will testify against them are Misses Fannie and Denise Luteli.

Collins is a Slugger. Michael Collins, a modern Hercules, was arrested Monday night for being drunk and he knocked the arresting officer into a corner. The patrol wagon was called and it was found necessary to put the handcuffs on the prisoner in order to handle him. On the way to the station Collins attempted to brain Officer Seoby with his handcuffs but the officer dodged in time to avoid the force of the blow. After arriving at headquarters Collins made another lunge at the officer and Seoby let loose a right-hander on his cheek bone with such force as to break his little finger. Collins was fined \$10 and costs in police court yesterday morning which he paid.

Warrell Arrested As a Disorderly. A warrant was issued from police court yesterday for the arrest of Frank Warrell, proprietor of the Michigan house on a charge of disorderly. The complaint was made by Miss Hattie Vandervort who said she went to the hotel to see her friend, Ida Reynolds, and some trouble with Warrell followed. He could not be found by the officers yesterday.

Want Them Set Aside. The final hearing in the suit brought by Willard S. Brown and others against the Grand Rapids Parlor Furniture company is in progress in the United States court. The case is one brought in equity to obtain the setting aside of certain securities as far as possible and to prohibit the distribution of the proceeds among preferred creditors.

Hattie Isn't Naughty. The case against Hattie High for disorderly was nolle prossed in police court yesterday. She was one of the number arrested Friday night on Kent street for street walking, but it developed that she is a working girl and had been out nights quite frequently. She promised to be more discreet in future.

Will Foreclose the Mortgage. Melissa Phelps has begun proceedings in the circuit court against Lizzie C. Popp and others to foreclose a mortgage on lot thirteen, block five, situated on One's addition. The mortgage was given July 1, 1886, by John D. Popp, deceased, to secure a promissory note for the sum of \$900.

Parsons Arraigned. Harvey Parsons was arraigned in Justice Brown's court yesterday on complaint of Liveryman Perrin of Lowell for the larceny of a horse and carriage. He waived the reading of the complaint and remanded an examination which was set for next Monday at 10 a. m.

Sue's Gain Convicted. Susan Cain, one of the streetwalkers arrested Friday night, was convicted in police court yesterday and fined \$10 and costs, or in default of payment to be confined in the county jail for thirty days. She could not pay her fine and was committed to jail.

Divorced From Her Husband. Laura E. Galloway was divorced from Jerome N. Galloway yesterday by Judge Adet on the ground of cruelty. The divorced husband was prohibited from re-marrying for a period of two years from the date of the decree.

Court Notes. Charles Reed, the young man arrested some time ago for stealing the trousers which he had on, and who was bound over to the circuit court for trial, was arraigned in the circuit court yesterday and pleaded not guilty to the charge of larceny. He will be placed on trial in Judge Adet's court this morning.

George Reuther was arraigned in the circuit court yesterday on a charge of attempting to kill George Murray by poison and pleaded not guilty. The parties were residents of Grand Rapids and the trouble occurred a few months ago.

Fred Lambert pleaded not guilty when he was arraigned in Judge Adet's court yesterday morning on an information for larceny. He is charged with having stolen a carriage from a Plainfield farmer.

William Seymour, the Spring street

resident who was arrested by Sheriff Mousen for larceny from the rural districts, was arraigned in the circuit court yesterday and pleaded not guilty. The case of the people against George Goldie, accused of an attempt to poison, will come up in Justice Westfall's court again today for a continued examination.
