MASHERS TAUGHT A LESSON

No Cause of Action in Guy Johnston's Case—Seymour Is Convicted.

Campbell & McNaab, carpenter contractors, have begun proceedings in circuit court against Carroll & Hartman, John W. Hartman, assignee of Mr. Hartman, and others, to enforce a mechanic's lien upon the Shelden building on Ottawa street.

Two Young Men Taught a Lesson by Judge Haggerty.

Julius Caesar, Jr., and Christian Straker, the two young men arrested for being too familiar with young women on the streets, were convicted in police court yesterday morning of being disorderly and were fined \$5 each and costs amounting to \$5.20 were assessed, to be divided between them, or in default of payment to be confined in the county jail for twenty days.

Johnston Pays No Damages.

By order of Judge Grove the jury in the case of William Denman against Guy A. Johnston returned a verdict yesterday of no cause of action and the defendant was given a judgment for costs. The suit was brought to recover damages for injuries alleged to have been received by having been run over by Johnston's team at Reed's lake and at a former trial in the circuit court the complainant obtained a judgment for \$1,500. The case was carried to the supreme court and ordered back for a new trial with the above result.

Seymour Was Convicted.

William Seymour was convicted in Judge Adelt's court yesterday of burglary and larceny. He was arrested a few months ago by Sheriff McQueen, and wagon loads of old harnesses, forks, grain bags, rakes, straps, whips, etc., were found in his residence on Spring street. The articles had been stolen from farmers in the outlying districts by Seymour, who operated during the night time. Many of the articles were identified by the owners. He will be taken into court this morning to receive sentence.

Susie Calkins Was Guilty.

The trial of Susie Calkins, on a charge of keeping a house of ill fame at No. 4 Island street, was completed in police court yesterday morning, resulting in her conviction. The testimony that convicted her was given by an old soldier from the Soldiers' home. The judge fined her \$25 and costs, amounting to \$29.31, or if the amount shall not be paid to be confined in jail for sixty days. Susie was prepared to pay and dropped the money into the palm of Clerk Stevens.

Divorced With Alimony.

Judge Adelt yesterday granted Agnes Conroy a decree of divorce from her husband, Bernard Conroy, on the ground of extreme cruelty. The wife was given the custody of their minor child and the defendant was ordered to pay \$5 per month for the support and maintenance of the child until further ordered by the court.

Wishes to Be Divorced.

Julius Arndt filed a bill of complaint with clerk of the circuit court yesterday against his wife, Minnie Arndt, charging her with desertion and asking the court to grant him a decree of divorce on that ground. The parties were married in 1882 in the German empire, and the wife deserted the husband June 15, 1888.

He Understood His Case.

The jury in the case of the people against Charles Reed, charged with the larceny of a suit of clothes from a Cannon township farmhouse, could not agree on a verdict at the trial in Judge Adelt's court yesterday and it was discharged. Reed then pleaded guilty to the charge and the judge suspended sentence upon him.

Police Court Notes.

Emery Beach was arrested yesterday morning on complaint of George Mason for assault and battery, but when the case was brought up for trial in police court the complainant did not wish to testify against him and Beach was released under suspended sentence upon \$250 bond.
