Ball Released on Bail. Gilbert Hall, the deputy postmaster at Morley, who has been in jail for several months on a charge of stealing registered letters, was released from jail yesterday on bail. When arraigned in the United States court a few days ago he pleaded guilty and Judge Stevens deferred sentence.

Skinner in Court. Reuben Skinner, the aged Plainfield man who has been awaiting an examination for attempting to bribe his wife with an \$1, was arraigned in Justice Westfall's court yesterday afternoon.
