A neighbor asserts that between 7 and 8 o'clock Monday night a white horse attached to a road cart stood before Lampman's house for nearly an hour, and Sheriff Pollock is now endeavoring to locate the animal.

Another Plagman Killed. DETROIT, Nov. 13.—The railroad crossing at Livonia avenue has claimed its second victim within a week. A few days ago Plagman McPherson was run over and died at the hospital. Late last night his successor, a man named Isaac Zell, 60 years old, was instantly killed by a passenger train. He was a new man at the business, and in stepping out of the way of a switch engine placed himself in front of the other train. Coroner Haddock had the body sent to Genia's, and will hold an inquest Saturday morning at 9 o'clock.

Looked Down the Muzzle. JACKSON, Nov. 13.—William Lick, aged 16, living at No. 411 Elizabeth street, experienced some difficulty in removing a load from a gun. He then poured kerosene down the barrel and dropped a live coal in after it. A moment later he peered down the barrel, when an explosion occurred and his face was covered with powder and horribly mutilated. He will undoubtedly recover, but will probably retain disfigurement for life.

Fight to a Finish. JACKSON, Nov. 13.—Last evening articles of agreement were signed for a fight to a finish, with gloves, between Prof. E. D. Cole, of this city, and A. J. Moore, of Detroit, under Marquis of Queensbury rules. The fight is to come off in three weeks, at some place in this city, and it will be for \$50 a side, the forfeit money having been deposited. Prof. Cole will be under the management of William Laverne, of Saginaw.

Her Hair Was Ablaze. IONIA, Nov. 13.—Marshall Welch while passing the house of J. M. Moore saw flames inside, and upon entering found a lamp had exploded, throwing the oil in all directions. Mrs. Moore's clothing and hair had caught fire, and but for the timely arrival of Welch she would probably have been burned to death, having fainted. Welch was severely burned while heroically extinguishing the flames.

Soo Jail Must Be a Tough Place. SALT SPRING, Nov. 13.—James McLaughlin made an unsuccessful attempt at suicide in the county jail. He drank the contents of a half-gallon bottle of laudanum, and for five hours he was apparently dead, but Dr. A. E. Bacon has hopes of his recovery. McLaughlin has been in jail for two months on a charge of larceny, and said he would prefer death to being cooped up in jail.

Gale on Lake Superior. CHEBOYGAN, Nov. 13.—Steam barge Maggie Duncan stranded on Point aux Pins last night. She is a foot and a half out of water forming. Wrecker Manistiquie has gone to her relief. OSTONAGO, Nov. 13.—Furious north gale is blowing on Lake Superior. Boats have been falling and freezing, and livestock would have a hard time to weather the storm.

Missing Genesee Juror. FLEMING, Nov. 13.—George Thayer, a well-known resident of this city and a juror of the present term of the circuit court, is missing. His wife has filed a bill for divorce, an injunction has been issued against him from disposing of any of his property, and now that he has gone the property has been attached by relatives.

Two Chinamen Caught at the Tunnel. PORT HURON, Nov. 13.—Two Chinamen were arrested at the tunnel station this morning by Customs Officer Merrymann as they were in the act of getting out of a car which had just come through the tunnel. They were placed in the county jail to await examination. They claim to be residents of the United States.

Killed by a Donkey. ADRIAS, Nov. 13.—Perry Richardson, aged 10, and the son of a Lake Shore switchman, was knocked down by a donkey during the democrat blowout Wednesday night and received internal injuries that will cause his death. He has been unconscious most of the time since the accident and may not survive the night.

Can't Pass on a Single Track. SAGINAW, Nov. 13.—Owing to a misplaced switch on the electric railway two cars going in opposite directions came together. The platforms and roofs of the cars were badly broken and one of the motormen had a hand injured. The passengers escaped with only a bad fright.

His Injuries Were Fatal. PEQUOKEE, Nov. 13.—Stanley Herriek, the young man who was so seriously injured by a gunshot wound while hunting two weeks ago, died at 5 o'clock yesterday morning. He was a young man of much promise and very popular among his associates.

A Wife-Shooter Sentenced. MY PLASSANT, Nov. 13.—Ad. Hutchinson, the man who shot his wife on the evening of Decoration day last spring, was found guilty of shooting with intent to kill, and was this morning sentenced to three years imprisonment.

Mayor Pingree for Senator. DETROIT, Nov. 13.—Politicians here are figuring that Luce and Stockbridge may cause a dead lock in the fight for United States senator. If such should be the case Detroiters will urge Mayor Pingree as a compromise candidate.

Fife Lake Gets a Buster Factory. FIFE LAKE, Nov. 13.—The first creamery in northern Michigan using

the Elgin process will locate at Fife Lake. Arrangements are just completed for the erection of a creamery that will have a capacity of 600 cows. The town is booming and people from the smaller towns are moving in rapidly. There is not a house for rent.

State News in Brief. Bay City is becoming so good that her citizens are not even allowed to get shaved on Sunday. Three barbers were arrested because they opened their shops an hour or so one Sabbath day and shaved a few patrons who were too sleepy to come around the night before.

The local option movement took a positive phase at Wayland Tuesday evening. The county committee consists of J. W. Humphrey, president, R. M. Sprague, secretary, H. D. Spaulding, treasurer, and 500 petitions will be circulated in the immediate future.

A prominent manufacturer of Albion said to his employees Wednesday: "Well, boys, if they give us free trade, you'll have to stand it. I shall keep up my profits, and whatever cost has to be made will come from your wages."

DOES NOT HOLD ON

Cleveland's Election Effects Certain Lines of Trade.

REACTION AFTER ELECTION

Failures Are Greatly Increased for the Past Week—Speculative Circles Apprehend Monetary Pressure Soon.

New York, Nov. 13.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade will say: "No important change appears in the condition of business. The distribution of products continues enormous. Production by manufacturers is greater on the whole than in any previous year, and the general tone of the business and industries is remarkably healthy. In the speculative circles, however, some apprehension of monetary pressure at no distant date appears, and some fear that the Washburne anti-option bill may be passed at the opening of the season in December is felt in operations on the board of trade. In spite of this, trading in cotton has been much the largest ever known in any week, but in other products and stocks dealing has been but moderate."

At Boston business continues large. Collections good and money easy. In general the situation is unchanged, excepting that wool is more quiet, but the mills are very actively employed, and the situation in cotton goods highly encouraging with advanced prices. The shoe trade is in good shape with bright prospects, and lumber rendered active by the open season for building.

At Pittsburgh the demand for pig iron is good and finished products moving freely. Plate glass is very dull, but other glass trade unchanged. At Cincinnati prospects for all spring trade are encouraging, and the wholesale hardware trade is good. In most lines business at Cleveland is good, with no apparent decrease for roller iron, but some large orders for pig iron have been countermanded. There is strong demand for money, but collections are fairly good. Manufacturers continue busy at Indianapolis and the jobbing trade good. Business is prosperous in all lines at Detroit and collections very fair.

Chicago reports good wholesale trade and collections very fair. Heavy receipts of lumber and shingles, but a decrease of sixty per cent in the real estate sales. Receipts of corn, wheat and butter show a large increase over last year, but decrease is seen in oats and wool, dressed beef, hides, flour and rice. Money is in strong demand at 6 per cent. Trade continues strong at St. Louis, with collections prompt. Milwaukee reports larger trade. Jobbers at St. Paul report trade up to last year's, but backward collections.

At Kansas City collections are large, but grain receipts light. Money is in better demand and business fairly active. Denver reports very satisfactory trade, with collections good. At Nashville business is improving rapidly. In the great industries light change is seen. Business failures during the past seven days number for the United States 205, Canada 35, total 240, as compared with 210 last week, 238 the week previous to the last and 285 for the corresponding week of last year.

MATHER WILL RETIRE. Her Husband Has Induced Her to Close Her Season.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Nov. 13.—G. G. Pabst, son of the rich Milwaukee brewer, whose recently make known marriage to Margaret Mather has been alternately denied and affirmed, arrived here yesterday afternoon, and will make Terre Haute his future home. A strong personal friendship has existed for several years between young Pabst and Herman Hummel, Jr., son of the wealthy grocer, and Pabst has visited here several times. After his marriage to Miss Mather became public, he decided to engage in business for himself and has bought an interest in the firm of Hummel & Beggs, wholesale liquor dealers. Miss Mather's western engagements will be canceled early in the month and she will say farewell to the stage. Mr. Pabst leaves for the east tomorrow on a business trip, after which he will join his wife in California, returning to Terre Haute early in December.

Mr. Pabst has received, among many telegrams of congratulation, one from Governor Peck of Wisconsin, of whose staff Pabst is an officer.

Dies for a Pair of Blankets. GILLET, Wis., Nov. 13.—In a quarrel between Richard Kingston and Robert Newton over the ownership of a pair of blankets Newton emptied the chamber of his revolver into Kingston. Five shots were fired, each of which took effect, one of them passing through the abdomen. Kingston managed to crawl from the house and was found in a bad condition. Physicians were summoned, who pronounced the wounds fatal. Newton remained in the house for some time, not daring to enter. He finally came out and gave himself up to the authorities and was taken to the county jail.

PARIS, Nov. 13.—After a long and exciting session of deliberation, the chamber of 519 to 228, decided to discuss the articles of the government bill for the suppression of anarchist newspapers. There is a consensus of opinion, however, that this merely postpones the fall of the cabinet.
