

HIS LEG IS BROKEN

Lieutenant Hurley Wrestles With a Polander.

WHO WANTED BEER OR BLOOD

Sunday Night Incident at Steeking and Fourth Streets—How Leonard Van Bloos Was Shot.

Lieutenant Hurley broke both bones of his right leg last night while trying to arrest a riotous Polander. The accident occurred near Echteroch's saloon at Steeking and Fourth streets. About 7 o'clock one of the numerous "skis" and "wits" living in that neighborhood ran amuck. Then in company with some more "skis" and "wits" he bombarded the front door of a house and demanded beer or blood. After he made the fourth charge the neighborhood was aroused and a big crowd of the children of dismembered Poland gathered in the street to watch the result of the attack. Lieutenant Hurley, who lives a short distance from the scene of the disturbance, came down and attempted to arrest the slave despoiler of Bacchus.

The Polander immediately formed himself into a hollow square, and attempted to resist arrest. He finally grabbed the handles of the door and in jerking him away both the lieutenant and his prisoner fell from the platform to the ground. The distance is about three feet, and Hurley turned quickly with the intention of being on top when they landed. He was; but his right leg caught under the prisoner's body and both bones were snapped, one just above the ankle, and the other a little higher. Lieutenant Hurley hung to his feet, but as soon as it was discovered that the lieutenant's leg was broken the Polander's friends rescued the prisoner.

Lieutenant Hurley was taken to his home on Steeking street in the ambulance, and Dr. Kelly was called to set the bones. The lieutenant was resting very comfortably late last night. He knows by sight the man whom he attempted to arrest, and the detectives will hunt him up.

YOUNG HODGES NOW TALKS

Of How Leonard Van Bloos Came to His Death.

Leonard Van Bloos, the boy who accidentally shot himself Saturday afternoon, died at the U. S. A. home at 9:20 yesterday morning without having regained consciousness. Yesterday young Hodges relaxed and told the story of the shooting and it proved to be another case of "didn't know it was loaded." He says they were playing in the sitting room and the old revolver was brought out to be used as a plaything. It was given to Van Bloos, and he picked it up and said playfully "I guess I'll commit suicide." He pulled back the hammer and when it fell the cartridge was exploded.

Hodges then went to the next house, but no one was at home, so he held young Hodges and the other boys in the accident and the police were informed. Hodges then put the revolver in the bureau drawer, where it was found.
