It wants decisive action at once, and the general opinion now is that a special meeting will be called at an early day to take the case of the Santa Fe into consideration. The chairman stated that the other roads will consent to release the Santa Fe from the observance of the agreement, while members of the association further incline to the opinion that the association cannot be continued with both the Santa Fe and the Alton on the same terms of regulation, therefore, seems to be inevitable.

BOUGHT THE "L" ROAD.

How the Canadian Pacific Secured an Entrance to Chicago.

CHICAGO, Nov. 23.—It was currently reported in Chicago financial circles today that the real purchasers of the Lake Street elevated railroad is the Canadian Pacific railway. It is well known that the Canadian Pacific has for some years been anxious to secure an independent entrance into Chicago, instead of being, as it is now, a center of trackway and other facilities for conducting its business from the Washburn railroad, and the option previously granted to the Canadian Pacific has been behind the "L" road from its conception. To purchase a right-of-way into the heart of the city would cost at least \$20,000,000, whereas the "L" road will not cost one-fourth of that sum.

AMERICA'S POPULATION.

It More Than Doubled Between the Years 1850 and 1880.

Our population was, when Malthus wrote, doubling at the rate of one in twenty-five years. We have never had a uniform registration of births and deaths, and our national census is taken once only in ten years; so that we cannot tell for any period the exact annual increment of population or say how much is due to excess of births over deaths, and how much to immigration. The increase in the last decade of last century was 33.10 per cent., and for the first decade of this 30.38 per cent., probably the most rapid gains in population from natural causes—the immigration during these twenty years was but slight—of which we have any record. In these two decades there may easily have been, right along, 48 births per 1,000 inhabitants, and not over 28 deaths, giving a natural increase of more than 8 per cent. As the struggle for existence increases in severity families diminish in size, marriages are less frequent or entered into at a later age and population does not grow so rapidly. Our progress as a nation is greatly due to the natural wealth of our country, according to a writer in the North American Review. Even now we have of persons over seventy only 14 in 1,000, where France has 37, while females within the twenty-two years of possible maternity number 18 or 19 per cent., instead of 16, which is the average. During the fifty years from 1790 to 1840 our population doubled twice. The average per cent. of our entire national increase has been 32.7 per decade ever since 1790. Excluding the war decade it has been 33.95 per cent. Aside from the people who have come to us with territorial acquisition, we seem to have gained about 2.6 per cent. yearly ever since this century began. Between 1850 and 1880 we went from 23,191,876 to 50,155,783. That is, we more than doubled during those thirty years in spite of the war.

An Old Custom.

The origin of the custom of burying people with their heads to the west is unknown. From ages back races in all parts of the world have buried their dead with their heads to the west; not invariably, however, but with great uniformity. Probably the remote origin lies in the belief of an immortality and a resurrection, typified by the return of the sun every morning. The dead are buried so that when the time comes they may face the sun, which will wake them. The first pastor of the church at Easthampton, N. Y., it may be remarked, directed that he be buried with his head to the east, so that at the resurrection he might face his congregation; but so general is the custom of burying with the head to the west, that this direction is noted as an instance of the minister's eccentricity.

The Water Spider.

The water spider, which spends most of its time under water, carries a bubble of air for breathing on the under side of its body, and when this air is exhausted it comes to the surface for more. It is enabled to carry the air bubble beneath the under side of its body, which is covered with tiny hairs set so close together that the surface film of water holds the air in, although the air does, and thus the air is imprisoned among the hairs.
