

LABOR AT ITS BEST

Mr. Gompers States Some Important Issues

ON THE LABOR QUESTION

The Meeting in Independence Hall, Where There Have Been Before Many Appeals for Action.

When President Samuel Gompers calls the twelfth annual convention of the American Federation of Labor to order it will be in a spot halloved by a great cluster of historic memories...

"It will be a historic convention," said Mr. Gompers, "historic in its arrangement of the wrongs inflicted on labor and in its ringing appeals for long and of a stirring nature. They review in detail every one of the seventy strikes in which Pinkertons were called upon to interfere. They call attention to these repeated treacherous transactions of employers and ask for such legislation as will prevent a repetition of the Homestead and other like affairs. The evidence given before the senate committee during its recent investigation of the Homestead strike is utilized, and a large amount of testimony against employers and Pinkertons is deduced therefrom.

Among the delegates will be a group representing the Tennessee miners, and the resolutions on the troubles in that state hinge altogether on the charge of a miserable perversion of the law and a breach of faith on the part of the state government. The miner delegates of Tennessee have already outlined the legislation they need in their state, and for this programme they will ask the endorsement of the federation. The headquarters of the executive council will be at the Girard house, and there the credentials will be passed upon.

The present executive council comprises Samuel Gompers, president; P. J. McGuire, first vice president; William A. Carney, second vice president; Chris. Evans, secretary, and John B. Lennon, treasurer.

All of these will probably be re-elected, although there is some talk of a change in the vice presidency, and should the great railroad labor organizations decide to join they will certainly be honored by one of these offices. The reelection of President Gompers is a foregone conclusion.

The trade unions of Philadelphia have also arranged an elaborate programme for the entertainment of the guests, and a reception committee, under the guidance of H. L. Minas, will see that the delegates are properly looked after.

The representation in the convention will be upon the following basis: International and national unions with less than 4,000 members, one delegate; for 4,000 members or more, two delegates; for 8,000 members or more, three delegates; for 16,000 members or more, four delegates; for 32,000 members or more, five delegates, and so on. Local, trade or federal labor unions, state federations, central labor unions, trades assemblies or trades councils, one delegate each.

A DEMAND FOR DUMMY CARS

Risks to Which the Clerks in the Railway Postal Service Are Subjected.

The demand of the postal clerks that their mail cars be placed in a safer part of the train than now is a locomotive is very reasonable. I always get on a car near the center of a train, and although I have been in several accidents I have never been scratched. The unfortunate mail clerk, however, has no such opportunity of protecting himself, and, as the result, every time there is a head-end collision, or a locomotive jumps the track, the list of killed and injured is always headed by one or more mail clerks, if the train carried mail at all. It is, perhaps, impossible to make up trains invariably with baggage or express cars next the locomotive, and even if it were that would be only transferring a grievance from one class of employes to another, but, says the St. Louis Globe-Democrat, it would save companies money in the long run if they would run light but strong dummy cars next the engine, and let them bear the brunt of the shock when two trains try to occupy the same space at the same moment. The patent offices of this and other countries are full of models of rubber-protected and other cars designed for this purpose, and, although most of these are too complicated, costly and cumbersome to be used generally, some of them would answer the purpose well and not put the companies to unreasonable expense. Public opinion may one day become strong enough to compel their adoption for the purpose of saving life.

ORIENTAL RARITIES.

An Ancient Copy of Parts of Zacharia and Malachi on Papyrus Manuscript.

Among the rarities displayed to the recent congress of Orientalists in London, says the New York Evening Post, was a papyrus manuscript discovered a few months ago in Egypt, which is supposed by some authorities to be the oldest extant copy of parts of the Old Testament books of Zacharia and Malachi. The pages of papyrus when intact were about ten inches high and seven inches wide, each containing twenty-eight lines of writing, both sides of the sheet being used. The complete line contains from fourteen to seventeen letters. The sheets are bound together in the form of a book in a primitive though careful manner with cords and strips of old parchment.

The Greek of this document is written without intervals between the words, a custom observed both in old Greek and old Hebrew manuscripts. The papyrus is in fair preservation and is believed to date from the third or fourth century. Experts are inclined to the conclusion that the papyrus was copied from some excellent original of the Septuagint Bible, which was first translated about the year 280 B. C. for the use of the Hellenistic Jews in Egypt, who, having gradually forgotten the Hebrew tongue, had learned to speak Greek. The first summary examination has shown that it has several readings which surpass some of the other Septuagint texts in clearness of expression and simplicity of grammar.

What Becomes of Vassar Graduates.


