

SHE GOT THE PERMIT

An Allegan Woman Preacher Tells Louis Fuller

WHY SHE SHOULD HAVE A PASS

She Believes a Half Fare Ticket Is for the Glory of God and Proves It Conclusively.

Down in Allegan county there is a congregation of religious enthusiasts who call themselves "The Church of God." It is not known just what all the tenets of the faith are, but one of them is that it is not good for man to pay full fare when riding on railroad trains. The influence in the faith has been written in the C. & W. M. general passenger office in this city for half fare elderlyman's permits. This has been continued with regularity and enthusiasm. Finally, Louis Fuller was stricken with an acute attack of that first feeling. He began to suspect that the entire Church of God was holding Sunday school excursions at the expense of the railroad corporation, to whose interests he took. Mr. Fuller is a hardened sort of man, anyway. He doesn't care a continental hicker's red herring whether he is a driver away from the line of the C. & W. M. road or not, and his heart has more love and veneration for one who pays full fare than for ninety and nine just men that travel on a pass. Consequently when he received a letter the other day from one of the pious parates requesting that a half fare permit be issued to her, he wrote back to the agent, asking on whose authority that preaching was done, and why she was doing it. Yesterday he received the following clear and succinct reply:

Her Effective Appeal.

Grand Rapids, Allegan County, Michigan, 17th day of March, 1893.

Dear Sir:—I find enclosed application for special rate permit which was sent me (by Agent) some time ago but have been so busy working for the salvation of souls have delayed an until now.

The Agent at Brant, said he thought I ought to have a Permit and he would do what was right toward my getting one. Brother D. S. Warner and others to whom you have granted Permits said they thought it would be for the glory of God for me to write to you and explain matters. About the Holy Ghost. And the Spirit (Holy Ghost) of the Lord came upon me and He Jesus Christ has appointed me to preach to the poor to comfort those that mourn to preach deliverance to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set liberty to those that are bound, to preach the acceptable fear of the Lord. And this same Holy Anointing which I have received from my Father in Heaven, shall be upon me, and I need not that any man touch me for Jesus says the Holy Ghost shall lead you into all truth and He says the Holy Ghost shall teach you in the same hour what you shall say. Luke 12: 12. Also "1st John 2: 27" Jesus says those whom he calls he qualifies and it is He also who has given me my Commission. As to so many applying I know it is but I do know that so many of them are God's flying messengers (or Traveling Preachers) many of whom have not used their Permits only once and do not live here they have permits on nearly all roads where they are going Preaching the Everlasting Gospel. Now I have tried to state plain fact hoping they would convey the right meaning. Now all we have is the Lord's love and the Gospel and us. His calls are coming in on all sides we thought God would be glorified and more souls saved and His Kingdom Permitted by Saving all we could. I feel God Leading me to give you this Scripture. It is found in "Matt 10: 40" Jesus says whosoever will be ashamed of me here on earth I will be ashamed of him before my Father who is in Heaven. I have done it into one of the most of those 30 have done it into me." Yours Rep.

SHOT IN THE HEART

Richard G. Heddes Found Dead Pierced by a Bullet.

SUPPOSED TO HAVE SUICIDED

His Body Lay on the Steps of the Office of the Converse Company at 9:30 Last Evening.

Richard G. Heddes, aged 29 years, a peeler for the Sligh Furniture company, committed suicide last night by sending a ball from a .32-caliber revolver through his heart while sitting on the steps of the office of the Converse Manufacturing company, on Watson street, on the west side. He was found by Barney Gregory of No. 100 Butterworth avenue, and Bert Vreeland of No. 255 Butterworth avenue, at 9:30, as they were returning to their homes. He lay with his head on the walk, and a revolver containing three empty cartridges and two loaded ones was on the step by his side. The two men at first supposed he had fallen, and passed by without disturbing him. They called to Patrolman Harper and with the officer returned to where the man lay. It was soon found that the man was dead and upon examination a bullet hole was discovered over the left breast. His coat and vest were unbuttoned and that part of his shirt covering the wound was saturated with blood and was burned from the powder of the cartridge. The police department and Coroner Bradish were notified and the ambulance was sent to the scene of the suicide. The remains were taken to Koch's undertaking rooms.
