EIGHT PERSONS INJURED.

The Steamer Nellie Bly Blow Up Yesterday Afternoon.

WINDHAM, Ind., April 16.—The passenger steamer Nellie Bly, owned by J. F. Pashen & Co., while making a trip down the river this afternoon blew up, seriously injuring eight persons.

Others who were seriously and possibly fatally injured are J. F. Fishburn, proprietor of the boat, scalded and hurt internally; Clarence Fishburn, his son, badly scalded; Daniel Rhodes, badly treated and internally injured; James Long, badly scalded. When the accident occurred the boat was in shallow water. The pilot had discovered that there was something wrong with the machinery and was steering for shore.

SHOT A HUNNER.

Patrick Dolan Murders James Collins, the Fake Sprinter.

New York, April 16.—James Collins, 28 years of age, is dying tonight in St. Michael's hospital, Newark, from a pistol shot wound inflicted by Patrick Dolan, a saloon keeper at that place. Collins is a professional runner and lived in this city. He entered today in a foot race with another runner named Green and lost. Dolan who lost \$200 on the race charged Collins with selling out and Collins, fearing bodily injury, started to run. Dolan followed and seeing that Collins would escape him, drew his pistol and shot him. Dolan was arrested.

STRUCK AT DINNER.

Holland House Waiters Walk Out During a Big Rush.

New York, April 16.—Three waiters employed at the Holland House who spoke at a meeting Friday, regarding the grievances of hotel waiters, were discharged when they reported for work yesterday. As a result thirty seven of the forty seven waiters employed at the hotel struck at 6 o'clock last evening, when the dining room was crowded. The pantry girls and men and the "omnibus" men learning to be batters also struck and about fifty persons all told quit work.

FATAL RACE RIOT.

Hunt and Poles Have a Drunken Street Fight at Plymouth.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., April 16.—A bloody riot took place at Plymouth, four miles west of here, at an early hour this morning. The mob engaged in the fracas were all Hunt and Poles, who were under the influence of liquor. Re-

volvers, staves and clubs were freely used upon each other's heads until the police made a raid upon the mob. Six of the contestants were arrested and several made their escape. One man, known as St. Anselm Jacobowitz, formerly a member of Company A, U. S. A., was found lying on the ground unconscious. He was carried into a house near by and physicians were sent for. They found that his skull had been crushed in with a club. Everything was done to relieve the injured man, but he died at 6 o'clock this morning. The prisoners under arrest were sent to the county prison until Monday afternoon, when they will have a hearing on the charge of murder. The coroner will investigate the case in the meantime.

Clark's Accounts Straight.

KNOX, April 16.—The report telegraphed from here on April 12 that Holman Clark, the ex-clerk of the council, had been found to be \$1,200 short in the accounts was based on misapprehension. At a meeting of the council on April 10 the finance committee reported that it had reviewed the examination of the accounts of the clerk made by two expert accountants and found that there was nothing due to the city.

HONOR TO VERAGUA.

World's Fair Needs Cash.

CHICAGO, April 16.—Auditor Ackerman has made a report showing that the building of the world's fair has already cost \$16,708,825, twice the sum expended for the Paris exposition, and more must yet be paid out. The snowstorms and hard weather necessitated an extra expense of \$12,000. There is at present a cash balance of \$623,245, and \$2,351,253 due on contracts.
