

NO MATCH FOR IVES

Made Four Clusters Last Night and Quit

IVES 1,001. ROBERTS 932

The Englishman Weak on a Mass. Michigan Boy Out-Played Him at Nursing.

Chicago, Sept. 19.—As the result of the second night's play in the international billiard match between Frank Ives and John Roberts, Jr., the American again finished first, closely followed by the Englishman who played a magnificent out-bill game. By careful runs Ives rolled together clusters of 110, 157, 134 and 180 and quit. Roberts was away behind, but developed a wonderful reserve that nearly earned him a victory. He is a good man to bet on. Ives scored 1,001 to Roberts 932. On Monday the score was Ives, 1,000; Roberts, 863.

Ives began with the ball as left last night and scored forty-four. Play was very slow to the tenth when the Englishman got in a number of magnificent long strokes at low hazard and made thirty, following at once with forty-one and quitting on a mass, his weak point. As last night he did not accept opportunities to nurse. In the ninth inning Roberts missed a simple shot and protested against the balls. The gloves were changed and in the twentieth Ives got them to the upper cushion. He jumped the right upper pocket cleverly at thirty-two and reaching 110 from. The score stood 249 to 178 in the American's favor. In the twenty-fourth Roberts shored in pretty in pocketing the cue ball off the red and ran forty-one. The foreigner brought down the house by his splendidly calculated winning hazard. In the thirtieth Roberts made fifty-nine and Ives twenty-seven, the totals being 343 and 290 in the young man's favor. Slowly Roberts kept up until in the thirty-fourth he hit 327 and Ives 304, but the latter in the next inning rapidly ran out seventy-two, following with a tremendous mass. Along the upper rail he reached 100, but the balls froze at 120 and he had 488 to Roberts 327. The Englishman got forty-three in the forty-first, but Ives came back at him with 181, the best run of the night, leaving his total at 706 to 428 for Roberts. The latter now caused surprise by hunching double figures until he got almost even with Ives. In the forty-eighth Ives ran 140 with a total of 822 against 541. Roberts put together 178 in four innings and played a great billiard game. In the sixty-sixth and last inning Roberts scored 302. Ives had 982 and ran out with nineteen. The night's score was Ives, 1,001; Roberts, 932. Total: Ives, 2,001; Roberts, 1,855.






