CLOTURE BILL IS IN

Introduced by Mr. Platt, Who Advocated Its Passage.

SENATE LOSING ALL RESPECT

Present Rules Made It Almost Impossible to Do Business if Senators Take Advantage of Them.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—Mr. Peffer re-introduced the bill to provide for a bureau of laws, and asked that it lie on the table for the present. It is, with some modifications, the same as he introduced in May, 1892.

Mr. Platt offered the resolution for a cloture of which he gave notice last Tuesday.

The rules of the senate, Mr. Platt said, ought to facilitate the transaction of business. That proposition would not be denied. That the rules of the senate, as they stood today, made it almost or entirely impossible to transact business. The senate was fast losing the respect of the people. It was fast being considered a body that existed for the purpose of retarding and obstructing legislation. The country did not understand why the senate did not vote.

Two Ways Under the Rules. There were just two ways under the rules by which a vote could be secured. One was by getting unanimous consent to take a vote at a certain time. It had been demonstrated that that means of obtaining a vote, could not be made.

Next came what was sometimes known as the process of "riding the bill." This was for the friends of the bill to remain in continuous session until opponents were physically exhausted so that they could not struggle any longer. There were senators in favor of the bill who could not as a matter of physical ability continue in session day after day and night after night in order to get a vote.

He offered his resolution in good faith. As a member of the minority side of the chamber, he would stand by it through thick and thin. He did present it by authority of the minority. It offered in good faith, he pointed out, was practically the only way by which a vote could be reached on the repeal bill.

Mr. Hour thought that Mr. Platt's resolution was open to criticism, in that it gave the vice president (who was not a member of either side) the power of determining action of the senate if, self-a power of fixing a day to close debate and a day to take a vote.

Mr. Hill suggested an amendment to the proposed change of rules providing that when a bill has been debated on diverse days, amounting in all to thirty days, it shall be in order for any senator to move to fix a date for taking a vote, that no motion shall not be amendable or debatable, and if carried by a majority the vote on the bill and pending amendments shall be taken without further debate or amendment.

Mr. Stewart announced himself as ready to prove, by many precedents, the immense advantage of deliberation in the senate and a gag rule should not be adopted.

Mr. Folger also explained himself as desirous of speaking to the resolution, but he did not wish now to interfere with the senator from California (Mr. White), who wished to address the senate.

The resolution then went over till tomorrow, although it had been previously referred to the committee on rules.

Wants a Monetary Commission. The repeal bill was then taken up and Mr. Gallinger gave notice of an amendment which he intended to offer to it, looking to the appointment of a monetary commission of three experts from private life, to be appointed by the president, three senators and three representatives.

THEY FLEE FROM RIO

Residents Fear Admiral Mello Will Bombard It.

NEGOTIATING WITH REBELS

Attempt to Save Brazilian Capital From Destruction—Petropolis Government Is Doomed to Fall.

LONDON, Sept. 21.—Private dispatches received here today from Rio, Janeiro say that the situation there is unchanged. There has been no talk of treating with Admiral Mello, the commander of the rebel squadron who yesterday sent an ultimatum to the authorities demanding the surrender of the city under penalty of bombardment. The general opinion is that negotiations with Admiral Mello should be entered into, would be fruitless of result, it being believed that he is determined upon the unconditional surrender of the capital. The excitement in the city continues. It is hoarsely expected that Admiral Mello will order the bombardment to be threatened, and with his ships commanding the city it is known that the damage they will do will be immense. The rebel vessels are in positions to pour a furious fire into the city and the weather rebels have already fled the place. Those who are forced by circumstances to remain here are every moment expecting to see the city in flames. A prominent London banker house upon hearing of the attempt made by the Brazilian minister to belittle the situation communicated with their agent at Rio and received assurances that the situation at Rio is about as described in dispatches sent from there to London, in spite of the censorship of the government officials.

The statement by the Brazilian minister here that the "agitation" in Brazil is merely a political move made in view of the fact that a presidential election is to be held in the fall does not find many believers. A prominent London banker house upon hearing of the attempt made by the Brazilian minister to belittle the situation communicated with their agent at Rio and received assurances that the situation at Rio is about as described in dispatches sent from there to London, in spite of the censorship of the government officials.

Fleet Waiting Orders. The dispatches received today are similar to those received yesterday. The rebel fleet is only waiting for the signal to hurl death and destruction into Rio, and it is openly asserted that the negotiations now in progress will amount to little or nothing. Indeed, it is believed that the negotiations are intentionally prolonged in order to allow non-combatants to escape from the city and to enable merchants and others to make all the provision possible for their flight.

The "People in Rio admit that the revolt against Peixoto has grown to such a proportion that it will be better to let Rio fall into the hands of the insurgents than to expose it to the fearful bombardment it may at any moment receive from the rebel fleet.

New York, Sept. 21.—The Herald's dispatches from Brazil say that Admiral Mello's policy is to starve Rio into submission before again opening fire on the city. All vessels with supplies are prevented from entering the city. For the present hostilities are confined to the rebel victory at Niteroy where the government forces lost sixty killed and 120 wounded. In Montevideo it is firmly believed that the triumph of Admiral Mello means the restoration of the monarchy.

The London correspondent of the Evening Post says: "In an interview today Senor Correa, the Brazilian minister in this city, said that he believed President Peixoto to be still at Rio. He received cables from the ministers of foreign affairs, the interior and finance yesterday, referring to the restoration of business, thus showing that the government bureaus were still occupied. The banks at Rio were also transacting their ordinary business and exchange was quoted."

APPLAUD THE EMPEROR. William's Sympathy for Bismarck Favorably Commented On.

BERLIN, Sept. 21.—The report that Emperor William, upon hearing of Prince Bismarck's illness at Kissingen, sent a dispatch to the sick man expressing his sympathy and offering him one of the imperial castles as a residence has caused much newspaper comment. As a rule the papers approve of the emperor's advance toward renewing his friendship with the prince. The National Zeitung says that the emperor's advance to restore friendly relations, which ought never to have been severed, will receive warm approval from a majority of the nation.

ENTOMBED IN A MINE. Prospects that the Eight Men Will Be Rescued.

LONDON, Sept. 21.—Rescue parties worked all night and today to reach the eight miners entombed yesterday by the collapse of the shaft in the Dolomith mine in Cornwall. This afternoon they could hear the eight men singing hymns. They re-doubled their efforts and probably will tunnel through the intervening rocks and rubbish before morning. It is believed that all eight men will be gotten out alive.

Cholera in Hamburg. Hamburg, Sept. 21.—During the twenty-four hours ended at noon today there were three new cases of cholera and three deaths from that disease reported to the authorities here. All the cases and deaths reported were in the suburbs of the city. Four of the cases were at the Hotel Hohenfels, two at Neustadt, two at Barnbeck and two at Elmshutte. One case occurred on board the Rotterdam steamer Amstel which has been lying in the harbor since September 16.

Had Yellow Fever Abroad. LONDON, Sept. 21.—The health authorities at Portland declare that the sick men on board the Russian schooner Ligno is yellow fever. The Ligno sailed from Wilmington, North Carolina, August 8, for London. She put into Portland Tuesday in charge of her mate, Captain Kirshen, having died of the voyage. The second mate was also taken sick and died on the passage. Three of the crew are also sick and the health officers ordered the vessel in quarantine.

Home Bank Scandals. Rows, Sept. 21.—Public interest in the bank scandals was revived today by the action of the court of appeals, which committed for trial at the assizes court Sir Tansley, manager of the bank.

IS A SLEEK RASCAL

Julius H. Burwell Embezzles \$50,000 From His Company.

BANKRUPT THE FIRM

He Is One of the Leading Citizens of St. Paul and Held Many Offices.

St. Paul, Sept. 21.—Business and social circles were shocked beyond measure this evening upon learning that Julius H. Burwell, vice president and treasurer and general manager of the Mast, Buford & Burwell Carriage Company was charged with misappropriating \$50,000 of the funds of the company. The firm was forced into an assignment on Monday by the financial methods of Mr. Burwell. The complaint charges that Burwell has been a member of the corporation for eight years at a salary of \$5,000 a year, and as treasurer has at all times had access to the funds of the firm. It states that Burwell, instead of taking the \$50,000, which was his rightful dues annually, appropriated to his own use sums far in excess of what was stipulated. The amount wrongfully taken, \$40,000 is charged to have been taken in money and the remaining in carriages and other merchandise. Among the items given is one of \$10,000 which General Manager Burwell is alleged to have taken for the purpose of erecting a fine residence. Julius H. Burwell has been considered one of the leading citizens in St. Paul for many years. Last year he was president of the State Agricultural society and last June he was the central figure in carrying out the program of the Hill celebration. He is prominent as a Free Mason and has long been known as one of the foremost hustlers of St. Paul.

HE MARRIED A NEGRO. Jennie Mehl, a St. Paul Belle, Shocks Her Friends.

St. Paul, Sept. 21.—Social circles were given the greatest shock of the year upon the announcement that Miss Jennie Mehl, 29 years old, the pretty daughter of Eugene Mehl, until last week the proprietor of the Hotel Ryan, had been legally married to James Robinson, a negro who had been employed in the hotel. The license was taken out in Cook county, Ill., at the residence of Marion and Fuller streets. When Mr. Mehl and a reporter arrived at the young woman threw open the door and demanded, "Are you going to put my marriage in the paper?" The reporter admitted having such designs. "Don't you do it," she cried, "or you dare do it I will sue the paper. It is nobody's business. I will sue the paper if you put it in." Her husband is 22 or 23 years of age, and a mulatto. Through the interview he was silent. The bride refused promptly to assign any cause for her selection, or to give any of the couple's plans for wedding tour or housekeeping. The groom has been employed for two or three years at the Ryan as a table waiter and elevator attendant, the greater part of the time in the latter capacity. It is stated by attaches of the hotel that she shows a fondness for the society of her present lodge lod, but not in so marked a degree as to cause suspicion. It was noted that she was partial to riding in the elevator. The girl employs now profess to remember that she recreated with her own relatives who were present when she was married. Her present husband pulled the rope that at other times. When the Rev. Mr. Hickman was asked why he married a girl so prominent socially to a colored man he said: "Robinson came to my house and told me that he wanted to get married. I went with him to Wilson's house, which is about a block and a half away. There I found Miss Mehl. They had a license and wanted to be married. LYNCHED THE NEGRO. Roanoke Citizens Hanged the Body. Mayor Trout Missing.

ROANOKE, Va., Sept. 21.—The negro, Thomas Smith, who assaulted Mrs. Henry Bishop last night, was lynched this morning. He was found by the mob where the authorities had secreted him and dragged to his death. Not content with that, the infuriated mob carried his body to the river and there, in the presence of a throng of 1,000 wildly excited people, the negro's body was incinerated.

There is much indignation against Mayor Trout and the militia and many threats of vengeance are openly made. Captain Bird, commander of the militia, has left town. Mayor Trout has also disappeared and President Buckner of the city council is acting as mayor. Excitement is running high now. The citizens are talking of holding an indignation meeting and it is rumored on the streets that threats are being made to burn the town unless satisfaction of some sort is rendered.

MONEY RECOVERED. Detectives State the \$70,000 Will Be Shown in Court.

CHICAGO, Sept. 21.—The big Hancock, Michigan, express robbery is at an end. The detectives have completed their work, the evidence is all in, the money is traced and all the robbers arrested. They will be brought up for examination in the court at Marquette, Michigan, Saturday, and the money will be pronounced in court as evidence. Every dollar of it has been found and it is in a safe place. The \$70,000 recovered and the American Express company of the \$70,000 have confessed. A fourth would confess also if it were demanded of him, but the authorities do not want his evidence. The robbers are: Ed Hogan of Marquette, Michigan, an express messenger who has recently been living the life of a spent and who was the originator of the conspiracy; Dominick Hogan, his brother, who was the express messenger on the train that was robbed, and who had custody of the \$70,000 that was taken; Jack King, the famous champion of the United States at the Olympic style of wrestling; Jack Butler of Marquette, Michigan, an all-round crook who has done his term in the state's prison; George La Liberty, an ex-railroad stoker who was out of work and who was the only man in the party who was capable of handling a railroad locomotive.

PASSENGERS SHAKEN UP. Baltimore & Ohio Express Dashes Into a Freight Train.

CRIST, Ohio, Sept. 21.—At 1 o'clock this morning the Baltimore & Ohio fast passenger, No. 6, west-bound on the Pittsburg and East, came through Ravens at a terrific speed. The train consisted of nine vestibuled sleeping cars. On the siding stood freight car No. 86, which had failed to "get into the clear." There was a rear-end collision and the caboose and several cars of the freight were demolished. Conductor King of DeForest was lying in the caboose and was instantly killed. A brakeman jumped and saved his life. The engineer and fireman of the passenger were injured, but not fatally. Passengers were badly shaken up, but no serious injuries were sustained. The passenger train was delayed about six hours.

FOUGHT WITH SABERS. Two Men Fought Over a Young Lady Love.

CHICAGO, Sept. 21.—A fierce duel was fought at Cheltenham Beach, fifteen miles south of Chicago last night. The combatants were William Ficklen of this city and a Philadelphia man. BATTLE WITH MASKED MEN. They Attempt to Hold Up a Train and Are Captured.

CENTRALIA, Ill., Sept. 21.—The New Orleans limited train on the Illinois Central road was held up last evening just outside of the city, and in the battle which followed between the three robbers and the train hands, one of the robbers was fatally wounded and three of the train crew were injured. The robbers were taken to the county jail. The wounded are Engineer Young, Conductor Oldum, Fireman McDowell and one of the robbers, name not known.

The train from Chicago reached this city at 11:45 o'clock. Three men, heavily armed, had been in the train since it entered into the city, and had been in the express car. Engineer Young had hardly pulled open the throttle when both Fireman McDowell and the engineer heard a noise on the tender behind them. Both turned and saw standing there in the night two big revolvers. They followed a battle royal. The messenger and conductor were plucky, and partly barricaded by boxes and packages fired at the robbers as fast as they could shoot. The thieves fired too, but they were at a disadvantage.

During the shooting the conductor received a slight pistol shot wound in the hand. Neither side seemed to be able to conquer, when help came to the railroad employes. The promiscuous shooting had aroused the passengers and they, terrified and just waking, had been busy concealing their valuables.

Handies Are in Jail. CHICAGO, Sept. 21.—Four men, who attempted to rob the express car on the New Orleans limited train on the Illinois Central railroad at Centralia last night are under arrest, three at Centralia and one at Odin.

The names of the men injured are: George Jones, robbin' light in a black and white coat; shot badly hurt. A. J. Odum of Centralia, conductor of train, shot in hand. Ben M. Young of Centralia, engineer of train, shot in arm and back; wounds painful but not dangerous. Fred McDowell of Centralia, fireman on train, scalp wound, caused by bullet.

Tioga Case at an End. BUFFALO, N. Y., Sept. 21.—Judge Cox today quashed the indictment against J. C. and W. H. Bright, charged with shipping naphtha as oil on the steamer Tioga and sustained the demurrer of the defense to the indictment in the fourth count of the word "vessel" was used instead of "steam vessel," the law only applying to vessels propelled wholly or in part by steam.

Cleaned Up \$40,000. CHICAGO, Sept. 21.—It is likely that the inside history of the fake World's Fair Excursion & Transportation Boat Company will come out in a suit for dock rent soon to be tried in the superior court. The leaders in the scheme have openly boasted that they cleaned up \$40,000 from the sale of stock without putting in a cent.

Advance in Coal. NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—The Reading Coal and Iron company has announced an increase of 25 cents a ton in the price of coal from October 1. The prices will be: White ash, all sizes, to families, \$5.75; red ash, all sizes, to families, \$5.25; white ash, to power, \$5.50; white ash, in yard, to carts and loaders, \$5.

Hog Cholera HARKING. OAKLAND, Ill., Sept. 21.—There is an epidemic of cholera among the hogs in this vicinity and they are dying by the hundreds. SAMUEL ARBID, living two miles west of this city has lost over two hundred head of hogs in the last week.

Robbers Took to the Woods. St. Joseph, Mo., Sept. 21.—The tug North Star, with a squad of regulars from Fort Mackinac, who were after the Mackinac Island postoffice robbers that successfully made armed resistance to a St. Joseph party, came across the robbers' sailboat last night forty-eight miles west of this north shore. The robbers had taken to the woods and were seen on several miles in land by a householder.
