AFFAIRS IN THE SOUTH.

The following is an extract from a letter received to-day by General Spinner from a gentleman now traveling through the South, whose facilities for obtaining correct information in regard to affairs in that section are unrivaled:

"The tone of the rebels in New Orleans is improving. They have discovered that the North means to be safe, and they do not seem to me near so offensive as they were three months ago, in their disloyalty. In Mississippi the hatred to the Yankees seems universal. The same is true of part of West Tennessee, Alabama and Georgia. Up the Mississippi the Yankees are as good as anybody else. Just now the negro is king—He has set his foot down and won't work where he thinks they don't mean to give him a fair show. There is not a negro who will go up into Mississippi, for the reason that the laws passed at the late session of the Legislature are designed to re-enslave them. In Louisiana they are in the main, working well, and are as orderly as ever they were, but there is not labor enough in the South to do the requisite work, and so, as I said, the negro is king. Those who get into his good graces are going to do well, but had luck to the poor planter who imagines that he can bully them as he used to do in days gone by. He will find it pretty hard to make a contract."—Wash. Cor. Cin. Gazette.
