**The Widow of William IV.**

Few Royal personages have descended to the tomb more worthy the respect and love of the English nation than the consort of the "Sailor King," the Queen Dowager ADELAIDE, who died in December, 1849. She was no less noble in quality than in station; her charities were extended throughout the kingdom, and beyond it; and at her death it was duly said that "her deeds were her best epitaph." Her quiet and unostentatious character may be inferred from the following last directions for her funeral, written in November, 1841:

"I die in all humanity, knowing well that we are all alike before the throne of God; and I request, therefore, that my mortal remains be conveyed to the grave without any pomp or state. They are to be moved to St. George's chapel, Windsor, where I request to have as private and quiet a funeral as possible.

"I particularly desire not to be laid out in state, and the funeral to take place by daylight; no procession, the coffin to be carried by sailors to the Chapel.

"I die in peace, and wish to be carried to the tomb in peace, and free from the vanities and pomp of this world.

"I request not to be dissected, nor embalmed; and desire to give as little trouble as possible."
