GREELEY IN MISSISSIPPI.

Grand Mass-Meeting and Barbecue at Holly Springs, Miss.—Old Times Come Again—Immense Gathering of People—The Utmost Limit of Enthusiasm Reached—A Gala Day—The Friends of Greeley Master in Strong Force—Liberal and Republican Speakers of Ex-Confederates—Earnest and Eloquent Pleas for Reconciliation, Peace, Fraternity and Good Will—The Past Obliterated.

HOLLY SPRINGS, MISS., September 26.—The largest and most enthusiastic Greeley and Brown demonstration which has taken place in the State of Mississippi took place here to-day.

THE GRAND PROCESSION.

Under the leadership of half a dozen marshals, the day was grandly and splendidly opened, and designated by red and blue sashes, rosettes, etc., was formed on the west side of the public square, and headed by the Lagrange Cornet Band.

The star-spangled banner, the proud emblem of the American nation, floated freely in the breeze, and what was or may be considered remarkable in a demonstration of this nature, was carried by a colored man, many of whom there are in this section of the country who support heartily the Liberal movement.

Altogether the outlook is hopeful, but we have only to wait a few more days for a tolerably certain indication of the great national contest in November.

Mass Meetings and Barbecues.

The Democratic and Liberal Republican State Executive Committees have made appointments for public speaking at fifty-three points in the state, beginning at Booneville, Prentiss county, Oct. 4, and ending at Raymond, Hinds county, Oct. 26, and embracing nearly the entire state.

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FORRESTER NOT THE MURDERER OF NATHAN.—A telegram from New York of the 23d says: "Forrester, the alleged murderer of Benjamin Nathan, was discharged to-day, the District Attorney advising the discontinuance of the case as he had not sufficient evidence to prove the guilt of the prisoner. Forrester was sent to the Tombs to await a requisition from the Governor of Illinois, where Forrester will be sent to serve thirteen years imprisonment. Judge Leonard granted a writ of habeas corpus, returnable on Friday, for Forrester on the ground that he is now held illegally, having been discharged from arrest in the Nathan murder case. Forrester is reported to have said yesterday if pardoned from the Illinois prison he will divulge who is the real murderer of Nathan."
