Town clerk's must return taxes voted at the annual town meetings to the county auditor on or before the 10th of October. Road overseers are compelled by law to return the land road tax warrants to the town clerk on or before the 1st of October; and the town clerk is obliged to return the delinquent list to the county auditor on or before the 1st of November.

Supervisors Whitney and Newton made a trip up through the woods as far as Cobb's crossing, on Monday, to examine into the condition of the roads and bridges. They were not very favorably impressed with the bridge at Cobb crossing and still less so with the Woodward Brook structure, on which over \$50 has already been expended this fall.
