REMOVE THE INDIANS.

The sentiment in Mille Lacs County Unanimous in Favor of the Removal of the Mille Lacs Indians.

The following petition has been signed by hundreds of white settlers in Mille Lacs county.

To the Honorable H. M. Rice and the other Commissioners appointed to Treat with the Chippewa Indians.

We, the undersigned citizens of Mille Lacs county, Minnesota, respectfully represent and petition.

That the so-called Mille Lacs reservation comprises a large tract of country in the northern part of Mille Lacs county, valuable for agricultural purposes as well as for the timber growing thereon.

That although this tract has been purchased by the United States government, it is unjustly, we believe, allowed to be occupied by a few small bands of Indians, to the exclusion of bona fide settlers who desire to make for themselves homes thereon.

That the outlet of Mille Lake is upon the so-called reservation, and that by reason of the inability of those interested to improve the said outlet, and in a measure to control the water supply from the lake, the lumbermen of said county, and through them the interests of all other citizens of said county, are compelled to suffer great loss.

We would further represent that the Indians upon said reservation, being under no restraint from the government, and in a great measure controlled by unprincipled white men who supply them with intoxicating liquors, have become dissolute in their habits, and will continue so to be unless restrained and placed under the immediate control and supervision of the general government.

Therefore, believing that the interests of the white settlers of Mille Lacs county demand it, and that the interest of the Indians located upon said reservation will be best subserved thereby, we respectfully petition that all honorable means will be used to compass the removal of the Indians from the said reservation, and that the same be opened for settlement.

Show us the man who having the time is unwilling to set trees on the highway for shade or ornament, and we will show a man who is largely selfish, and would withhold any act that would either directly or indirectly tend to benefit others if he could not see dollars and cents in it himself.

Man was not created for himself alone, nor to pass through the world working out only his own selfish purposes; and yet there are those who are, like the fable of the dog in the manger, unwilling to do themselves or let others do that are disposed to. The man who has even only a shadow of humanity about him ought to delight in doing anything that affords comfort to beasts of burden.
