

The Sunday game drew a big crowd and some mighty poor playing on both sides was witnessed. The home nine commenced the game with Gibbons in the box, then changed to Sausser, and Claggett caught. Score 16 to 17 in favor of the "Moxies."

The game Monday forenoon was the decisive one. The "Moxies" had things their own way until the first half of the ninth inning. The score stood 8 to 3. By hard hitting on the part of the Princeton and costly errors on the Moxies side the home club tallied nine times. In the last half of the ninth the Moxies succeeded in crossing the home plate once.
