The absence of a telegraph pole for climbing purposes somewhat interfered with the rendering of one number. With but one slight accident the program proceeded smoothly.

Mr. J. S. Collins, of the town of Robbins, is attending court as a grand juror. Mr. Collins is the man who lives on the land which the government proposes to reserve for an Indian burying ground, but why this particular piece should be chosen is a mystery to Mr. Collins, as he says there are no more graves on it than there are on any other piece at the lake. As Mr. Collins has improved the land considerably during his seven years' residence thereon, it seems unjust to deprive him of the fruits of his labor. At any rate he does not propose to let the matter rest as it is, but will try to get the next congress to recognize his rights.

The Moore Heating Co., of Minneapolis, is at work putting in the steam heating plant purchased for the court house by the county commissioners at their last meeting. The boiler is expected to be large enough to furnish steam for the entire building, but for the present only the lower story will be furnished with radiators. The small hot air furnace which has been used for the upper story will be retained. The large furnace was so badly out of repair that the rooms were filled with smoke and if it had been retained some costly repairs would have been necessary. The commissioners decided on the steam heat as being the cheapest, all things considered.

The village caucus was held at the village hall yesterday. It was called to order by Mr. G. I. Staples, chairman of the committee. The call was read and an organization effected with H. C. Cooney, chairman, C. W. Van Wormer, secretary and G. I. Staples and C. H. Chute, judges of election. All officers were sworn and at 2 o'clock the polls were declared open and remained open for one hour. There was no excitement of any kind, only one ticket being out. Twenty votes were cast, every one of them being for the following-named delegates to the county convention to be held at Jesmer's opera house at 1 o'clock to-morrow: H. C. Cooney, E. M. Chapman, E. K. Evens, Fred Newton, R. E. Jones, N. A. Ross, Henry Newbert, George Chalmers, Frank Morneau and T. F. Scheen.
