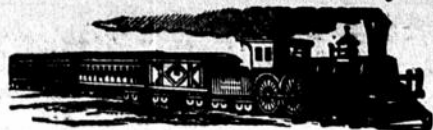

A profitable and interesting literary program was given Thursday at the home of Mrs. Townsend who read an article written by Prof. Geo. E. Foster M. P., entitled "Shall We License the Dram Shops."

When a community issues license it does three things: 1. It calls the dram shop into existence and permits its work.

2. It declares that the dram shop is correct in principle and expedient in practice.

3. It pledges its authority to the protection of the dram shop in its congenial and permitted work.

You become responsible for what it does. When an unlicensed dram shop plies its illicit trade and works its evil, the whole weight and responsibility falls upon the head of the law breaker.

Mrs. Woodcock read the delusion of high license by Rev. Kerick Johnson D. D. We sum up the article and ask the readers to balance account:

Mother's Suggestions—Our boy is out late nights. Father's Reply—Well we must tax the saloon \$50.

M. S.—Husband, I believe John drinks. F. R.—We must put the tax to \$100.

M. S.—My dear husband, our boy is being ruined. F. R.—Try 'em a while at \$200.

M. S.—Oh, my God! my boy came home drunk. F. R.—Well, well! we must make it \$300.

M. S.—Just think, William, our boy is in jail. F. R.—I'll fix these saloons, tax 'em \$400.

M. S.—We carried our poor boy to a drunkards grave to-day. F. R.—Well, I declare! We must regulate this traffic; we ought to have made that tax \$1,000.

Mrs. Norton's selection pictured a city of 10,000. In this city were 2,000 rate payers, owning equal property and paying equal tax.

This city needed \$10,000 for improvements and expenses for one year. There were two methods by which the amount could have been raised. First by direct tax.

Each payer being called upon to pay \$5 and 2,000 rate payers would have paid \$10,000. The second was to pay the tax indirectly, through the medium of dram seller tax gatherers.

These collected \$10,000 from the tax payers, (paupers and spendthrifts pay no taxes) and then give it back to the city treasury.

They then called from rate payers their living and profits for the year, an average of \$2,500 for each dram seller. The whole amount gathered by them from the rate payers was \$260,000 and this was all taken from the pockets of the people.

First method, direct payment: The city pays \$5 for each rate payer \$10,000. Second method, payment through dram sellers, the city pays \$130 for such rate payer \$260,000. Total loss to the city \$250,000.
