Whereas, a petition signed by Clay VanAlstein, a legal voter, freholder and resident in school district No. 10 in Sherburne county, representing that he is the owner of the following described lands, situate in said district, to-wit: the southeast quarter of the northwest quarter (sw 1/4 of nw 1/4) and the east half of the north quarter (e 1/2 of nw 1/4) of section four (4), in township thirty-five (35) north, of range twenty-six (26) west, which said lands adjoin school district No. 1 in Milaca county, and asking that he, with his said lands may be set apart from said district No. 10 in Sherburne county to said adjoining district No. 1 in Milaca county for the following reasons: that it is only three-fourths of a mile from his residence to the school house in district No. 1 in Milaca county, and by the way of a main traveled road, while it is 3 miles from his residence to the school house in district No. 10 in Sherburne county, and over half the way the roads are not traveled but very little during the winter season, thus making it impossible for children to attend said school during the winter and spring months, was presented to the board of county commissioners of Milaca county, Minnesota, at a session of said board held on the 8th day of January, A.
