State News.

The president has appointed Clinton D. Grinols to be postmaster at St. Cloud, Minn.

Pinned under an overturned wrecking car, Engineer Joseph Gallagher was scalded to death by escaping steam at the Seller dump, Hibbing.

A laboring man by the name of Johnson was robbed by three men in Crookston. They knocked him down and stole his watch and \$40 in money.

Of the six rural free delivery mail carriers out of St. Cloud three are of the feminine gender. Statistics give the total number of women rural mail carriers in the United States as fifty.

Dr. Koch, the New Ulm dentist who was three times tried for the murder of Dr. Gebbard, is violently insane and an inmate of the hospital at St. Peter, says the Grant County Herald.

Employment offices at Duluth are offering big wages to men to go to Wisconsin to work on the new Omaha construction. About seventy miles of track will be laid, and the work is to be rushed to completion as rapidly as possible.

An automobile containing William K. Hamm of St. Paul and three ladies struck the rig of John Turnbull at Hastings and Turnbull and his wife were hurled into a ditch, luckily escaping serious injury. The buggy was demolished.

August is the last of the big months for iron ore shipments from Lake Superior. With the advent of September the business falls off materially, and the biggest shippers always expect a diminution of at least 20 per cent from the average of the two or three preceding months.

Through the accidental discharge of a shotgun held in his own hand Fred Wheelock, the 14-year-old son of A. T. Wheelock of Bemidji, was instantly killed. The contents of both barrels of a double-barreled shotgun entered the side of his head, tearing loose an ear and taking away a portion of the skull.

The wages of nearly every class of workmen in the Northern Pacific shops at Brainerd have been raised. The aggregate increase will amount to over \$2,000 a month. This was accomplished by the committees of the various trades partly because of wages paid in the Dakotas for farm labor, which threatened to drain the shops of the common laborers and some of the mechanics.

Four prominent farmers of the town of Armor, near Fergus Falls, were fined \$15 each for selling milk that did not come up to the required test to a cheese factory. The law provides that milk cannot be sold unless it contains at least 3.5 per cent of butter fat, and the farmers were selling milk that tested as low as 2.5 per cent, the presumption being that they had either skimmed it or added water.

The army worm threatens Becker county and especially the vicinity of Audubon. It is a little brown worm, about half an inch long, and has been destroying the crops near Audubon. A sample of the worm was sent to the state entomologist, Prof. Washburn, for examination, and in his absence, Prof. A. G. Ruggles has replied to the communication. He says the worm is without doubt the dreaded army worm.

J. E. Carlson, who lives in Amador town, near Almelund, lost a 5-year-old girl in a peculiar manner. The child was given a bag of candy by her grandmother, who had just returned from town, and while jumping around the floor, happy over the gift, a large piece of the sweets slid down her windpipe, completely shutting off the wind. Despite every effort to dislodge the obstruction, the child was suffocated, dying in three minutes.

S. George Stevens of Duluth has been granted letters patent upon a device for saving life at sea. It consists of a ring lifebuoy rigged on a double tackle, rove through blocks on the fore and aftermasts, traveling the length of the ship at a height sufficient to clear the highest seas that might board her. The ring is fitted with a "breeches" attachment similar to the breeches buoy used by the life savers, and by aid of this men can be transferred from one end of the ship to the other in perfect safety under the most unfavorable conditions.

H. Invin of Hawkes Bay, New Zealand, has patented an alarm which can be attached to a scarecrow, or can be used in place of a scarecrow. Its principal object is to provide an efficient apparatus by which a series of explosions may be produced at definite intervals for the purpose of frightening birds or animals away from the crops, fruit and the like. PETITION FOR PUBLIC DITCH.

To the County Board of the County of Mille Lacs, State of Minnesota:

The undersigned land owners, whose lands will be liable to be affected by, or assessed for, the expense of the construction of the proposed public ditch hereinafter described, would respectfully represent that the public health, convenience and welfare and the reclamation of wet and overflowed lands require the establishment and construction of a public ditch along the following described route in the towns of Milo and Bogus Brook (being towns 37 N., ranges 26 and 27 west), in said county of Mille Lacs, and that the construction of the same would be of public benefit and utility.

A general description of the proposed starting point, route and terminus of said ditch is as follows: Commencing at a point ten (10) rods south of the northeast corner of the northwest quarter of the southwest quarter of section twelve (12), in township thirty-seven, range twenty-seven, and passing over and across the following described lands, in a southeasterly and easterly direction, as follows, to-wit: The E½ of the SW¼ and the SW¼ of SE¼ of section twelve, the NE¼ and the NE¼ of SE¼ of section thirteen, in township thirty-seven north, range twenty-seven west; the W½ of SW¼ of section eighteen, the N½ of SW¼ of section eighteen, the SE¼ of SW¼ of section nineteen, the S½ of the SW¼ of the SE¼ of section twenty, the SW¼ of the SE¼ of section twenty, the SW¼ of section twenty-one, the N½ of the NE¼ of section twenty-eight, the NW¼ of the NW¼ of section twenty-seven, the SW¼ of the SW¼ and the NE¼ of the SW¼ of section twenty-two, and terminating at a point in Rum river in said tract herein last described, as its outlet, in township thirty-seven north, of range twenty-six west.

And your petitioners pray that you will proceed to establish such proposed public ditch and cause the same to be constructed as provided by chapter two hundred thirty (230), of the General Laws of Minnesota for 1905.


