Stockholm.

The committees appointed for making the necessary arrangements for Sweden's participation in the Jamestown exposition have now submitted their report to the Swedish Technological society...

Two distinguished Chinamen, who have during the past month resided at Saltsjobaden, bade Stockholm farewell the other day, but they return to the celestial empire with Sally Cederquist...

Crownprince Gustaf, accompanied by Hofmarskalk Lilliebow, is now at the bedside of his consort, Crownprincess Victoria, who is ill at Karlsruhe. Her physician, Dr. Munthe, in his last bulletin says that her condition remains serious...

A young variety actress, who was popular in Stockholm because of her vivaciousness and beauty, committed suicide in Copenhagen at one of the down town hotels about two weeks ago.

Within less than two months the Stockholm public will have at its disposal for the usual fare consideration—fifty autotacs, thus enabling the Stockholmians, or the visiting tourists to travel by means of autos to all parts of the city for a nominal sum.

Prince Bernadotte has purchased the Engvald villa at Malmso, in Grodning, and he and the princess have already taken possession of the same.

G. W. L. Longren, for many years director of Stockholm's customs house, died at his home after a short illness a couple of weeks ago.

King Oscar will this spring move out to Saltsjobaden (the salt sea baths) where he will reside at Grand hotel.

Marquise Claes Lagergren, who is at the Vatican in Rome called on King Oscar during his recent visit in Stockholm and forwarded the pope's greetings to the aged monarch.

The Press club of Stockholm has received a donation of 5,000 crowns from a newspaper publisher, who desires his name withheld from publication.

The trophies in the historic Riddarholm's church are to be moved to the artillery museum, where there is already a large collection of historic Swedish flags.

DENMARK.

Copenhagen.

Elections for members of the Finnish diet were held March 15, says the "Politiken" (Copenhagen). These are the first elections since the revision of the constitution and the abolition of the ancient four-house legislature that perpetuated the privileges of the nobility, the burghesses and the clergy at the expense of the peasantry.

Russian fugitives are flocking into Copenhagen day by day, and there are now over 2,000 Russians there. Most of them are Russian Jews and they are colonizing in the Norrebro section of the city.

The Danish training ship Viking was blown over during a storm in a ship building yard in Copenhagen March 19. She had 400 workmen on board at the time. Only ten workmen were injured and there was no loss of life.

The "Alhambra Girls" is the name of a new operetta written by Mme. Heifrid Lambert, says the "Musiken" (Stockholm). The piece is a saga play and the scene is laid in Spain.

Proceedings of Board of County Commissioners of Mille Lacs County.

AUDITOR'S OFFICE, Mille Lacs County, Minn., Princeton, March 28th, 1907. Board of county commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. Full board present.

Meeting called to order by the chairman at 10 o'clock p. m. Hearings and discussion of various matters consumed the entire afternoon, and on motion the board adjourned until Thursday, March 21st, 1907, at 9 o'clock a. m.

Thursday, March 21st, 1907. County board met pursuant to adjournment, with all members present. The following claims against the county were audited and allowed in amounts as stated:

On motion the claim of \$3.31 presented by Fred Leander was rejected by a unanimous vote of the board.

The following reports of fees, emoluments and gratuities for the year 1906 were examined by the board, and on motion the same were duly approved: B. M. Van Alstein, judge of probate; K. H. Burrell, county treasurer; C. W. Burnham, register of deeds; Harry Shockey, sheriff; and E. E. Whitney, county auditor.

On motion the application presented by the First National Bank of Princeton, for correction of assessment and abatement of personal property taxes in the village of Princeton for the year 1906, was recommended for approval by a unanimous vote of the board.

Application was made to the board by Olof Olson, asking for correction of assessment and abatement of taxes for the year 1906 on the NE 1/4 of SW 1/4 section 2, in township 36, range 27, and on motion the board recommended that the said application be granted.

On motion duly made and carried by a unanimous vote of the board the petition presented by Roloff Vaaler, as attorney for Lars Eriksson and Anna Eriksson, was disallowed.

In the matter of the affidavit and bond filed by Chas. Heilig for the purpose of securing a duplicate of commissioners' warrant No. 7219, issued in favor of said Chas. Heilig on the 3rd day of December, 1906, for the sum of \$35.46, which warrant has been lost or destroyed and cannot be found, on motion the bond accompanying said affidavit and the sureties thereon were duly approved, and the county auditor authorized and instructed to issue the said Chas. Heilig a duplicate of said warrant No. 7219.

Affidavit and bond having been presented to the board by Nels Lindfors for the purpose of obtaining a duplicate of commissioners' warrant No. 7224, issued in favor of Nels Lindfors on the 3rd day of December, 1906, for the sum of \$34.50, which warrant has been lost or destroyed and cannot be found, on motion the bond accompanying said affidavit and the sureties thereon were duly approved, and the county auditor authorized and instructed to issue and deliver to the said Nels Lindfors a duplicate of said warrant No. 7224.

On motion of O. H. Uglem, seconded by L. S. Libby, the board decided by a unanimous vote, upon agreement with the board of supervisors of the town of Princeton, to build a 75 foot steel span, with an 18 foot roadway, for the bridge across the west branch of Hum river in section 7, township 36, range 26, known as the Taylor bridge, two-thirds of the cost thereof to be borne by the county and one-third to be paid by the town of Princeton; and the county auditor was instructed to advertise for bids for the construction of said steel span, to be received up to the hour of noon on Monday, April 22nd, 1907; plans and specifications to be submitted by the companies or parties bidding for the work, for approval and acceptance by the county board.

In the matter of the petition and bond filed by Frank Kaufert, claiming damages to his lands in the sum of thirty dollars by the construction of county ditch No. 2, and praying that viewers be appointed to ascertain and report the amount of such damages, on motion duly made and carried by a unanimous vote, A. Morehouse, George Schmidt and R. S. Shaw were appointed viewers in the above matter, and Friday, April 5th, 1907, at 11 o'clock a. m., at the county auditor's office in the village of Princeton, was fixed by the board as the time and place for the first meeting of said viewers.

On presentation of a petition signed by Albert Riebe and Amelia Adams, each a taxpayer residing in section 27, in township 37, range 26, stating that the boundaries of said section and its subdivisions are unknown, and praying that said section be surveyed and subdivided pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 7, of the Revised Laws of 1905, it was ordered by the board that a hearing be had on said petition at a session of said board to be held on Monday, April 22nd, 1907, at 2 o'clock p. m., and that notice thereof be given as required by law.

On motion of J. W. McClure, seconded by John Dalchow, the board decided by a majority vote to authorize the register of deeds to procure suitable and necessary books and transcribe books "A" and "B" of deeds and book "A" of mortgages, at a cost to the county of five cents per folio and not to exceed ten thousand folios for which payment is to be made.

On motion the board adjourned until Monday, April 22nd, 1907, at 11 o'clock a. m.
