## NEWS OF SCANDINAVIA

Recent Occurrences of Interest in Sweden, Norway and Denmark.

### GIFTED SINGERS IN AMERICA

Mrs. Emma Meissner and Miss Rose Gruenberg Will Give Their First Concert in St. Paul.

### SWEDEN.

Stockholm.

Mrs. Emma Meissner and Miss Rose Gruenberg, the two Stockholm prima donnas, arrived in New York last week. They are the prima donnas of the new Lyric Oscar theater of Stockholm and are great popular favorites with the opera and concert goers of Scandinavia as a whole. Their first concert will be held in St. Paul June 27. Mrs. Meissner is the wife of Hjalmar Meissner, one of the foremost of Stockholm's orchestra conductors. A personal friend of Mrs. Anna Hellstrom, she comes here warmly recommended by her. It is a fact that Mrs. Meissner's voice much resembles that of Mrs. Hellstrom, especially in the middle register. Also in personal appearance and manners there is a striking resemblance. The two gifted Swedish singers were resolved to start on their American tour last May or April, but this plan had to be given up on account of the tremendous hit made by Mrs. Meissner in the title role of "Die Lustige Wittwe," a new Viennese opera by Lehár. Mr. Ranft, the Swedish Frohmann, absolutely refused Mrs. Meissner a leave of absence, whereby the lucrative run of "The Merry Widow" would be cut short. Mr. Ranft was anxious to have this run if possible take on the proportions of "The Geisha" of a few years ago, when Miss Rosa Gruenberg, then in the teens, made a hit as Mimosa San, singing the part to 200 crowded houses. So the young divas had to postpone their trip until June, when the regular vacation season began. The leading artists at each Stockholm theater are generally allowed one recite or benefit concert towards the close of a successful season. A Stockholm daily thus describes the benefit tendered Mrs. Meissner, the other day: "The benefit performance of 'The Merry Widow,' or rather that of Mrs. Meissner, brought such an overwhelming success as one would have hardly expected so soon after the 100 performances of the opera only a few evenings previously. The Oscar theater was crowded in spite of the suffrage debate in the riksdag and the fine spring air. Already, in the first act, Mrs. Meissner received a score of giant floral offerings. In the second act three laurel wreaths, one of immense size, were brought up. After the last act, the orchestra greeted Mrs. Meissner with flourishes, the applause being endless and the flowers without number. How was Mrs. Meissner able to take these flowers with her to her home that night, or how would there ever be a place, with them there, for herself in it?"

During the recent Linne festivities in Upsala the representatives of the foreign universities were received in the university building, listened to a speech by the rector of the university, Professor Schuck, and read their addresses. Afterwards the students gave a garden party in the botanical gardens, where besides the prince regent, who with the greater part of the royal family, was present, both days, the famous Swedish poet, Vernor von Heidenstam, made a speech, which created great enthusiasm. The principal part of the second day's ceremonies consisted of conferring the degree of doctor of philosophy on several prominent persons, including the foreign celebrities mentioned above. Prince Eugen, the youngest son of King Oscar, was the first among the Swedes, who received the wreath of laurel, which signifies the degree of doctor of philosophy. Among the others there was one woman, Miss Selma Lagerlof, the famous Swedish novelist, the crowning of whom with the laurel wreath was received with great acclamation. The whole of this ceremony took place in the old cathedral, which offered a very appropriate setting to the imposing ceremony. Afterwards followed a big dinner and a ball in the university building.

There was no end to the feasting and jollification in Stockholm when the stork paid a visit to Prince Gustaf Adolf and Princess Margaret. The young prince was born the day after King Oscar and Queen Sofia had celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary, so the two important events came together. The jolly Stockholmians took occasion to celebrate and suffice it to say that all the cafes and every amusement resort in the city was overcrowded. The orchestras furnished national airs and there was general jollification all over the city.

King Oscar and Queen Sofia on their wedding anniversary received telegrams of congratulation from every court in Europe. The American minister called and tendered the well-wishes of President Roosevelt on behalf of the American government. King Oscar, who is a benign king, fed 3,000 of Stockholm's poor people on his wedding day and donated 100,000 crowns to be distributed among institutions of charity.

The mining village of "Malmberget" in Gellivara, has been ruined by

fire, more than 100 families being made homeless. Eight blocks of houses were swept away. Great distress prevails among the victims. One thousand acres of woods at Farila, in Ljusdal, were also destroyed by fire.

### NORWAY.

Christiania.

Steps have been taken in Christiania to teach as many as possible this summer to swim. A few days ago an assistant on one of the larger sailboats fell overboard near the club house of the Royal Yacht club, and, knowing nothing about swimming, drowned, although people were near at hand to save him had he only known how to keep himself afloat a few minutes. The incident caused the Royal Yacht club to decide that every person on board a sailboat during regattas hereafter must demonstrate his ability to swim. It is estimated that about 600 Norwegians lose their lives every year by drowning. The first regatta of the Royal Yacht club this season will be held June 8 and 9 in the Christiania fjord inside of Droebak.

Captain Roald Amundsen has just returned from St. Petersburg, where he delivered his last European lecture before the Geographical society of that city. He was received by the czar, who decorated him with the grand cross of St. Anna, one of the highest decorations of that country. In the near future Harry Randall, formerly of Minneapolis, Minn., who is to act as the business manager of Mr. Amundsen, will leave for America to make arrangements for his lecture tour there, which begins in October. At the annual meeting of the British Geographical society in London, the gold medal of that society was given to Captain Amundsen.

Frogner park is one of the loveliest spots in Christiania. During the winter the principal skating rink is located here; and during the summer young men use part of the field for football and other sports. At present carpenters are busy putting up building to house the National Agricultural exposition, to be held during June and July. The products of Norwegian farms will be shown in all their branches. The best cattle, horses, swine, etc., will also meet there. While the exhibition is strictly national in its scope, conventions of agriculturists from the three Scandinavian countries will be held in this city.

Latest reports from Christiania state that the storking has appropriated the sum necessary to send a war vessel with naval cadets aboard to America. About two weeks ago the Harold Haarfrage, after a flying visit to Christiania, where the king inspected the vessel, left Horten for America, via the Azores. New York will be the first stop in America, then Hampton Roads and the Jamestown exposition will be visited. The trip will be extended to Cuba, where the Norwegian minister will be taken on board and from there the Harold Haarfrage will proceed to South American ports in order to show the flag.

Arctic expeditions of different kinds, with Norway as starting point, are again getting busy. First among these is Walter Wellman's, which is going to the pole in an airship. Major Hersey of the United States army, executive officer of the expedition, has recently passed through this city on his way to the far north. According to his statement the expedition, thirty-five strong, expected to reach Spitzbergen about June 5, and about July 10 Mr. Wellman, Major Hersey and three other men will cut loose and through the air try to reach their goal.

The Norwegian parliament on June 15 rejected by 73 to 47 votes the bill providing universal suffrage for women, but adopted, by a vote of 96 to 25, a bill granting the franchise of the same conditions as in the case of municipal election that women themselves, in order to vote, must have paid taxes for a year. The new law gives the suffrage to all women 25 years of age taxed on an income enjoyed by herself or her husband of \$13 in cities and \$84 in the country. It creates 300,000 women voters. The reform is welcomed by the press.

King Haakon and Queen Maud have returned from their visit to the French capital, where they received a most hearty and elaborate reception, both by the president and the French public. While making the return trip the royal couple spent a day or two with the king's parents at Copenhagen.

### DENMARK.

Copenhagen.

King Frederick's Iceland trip was scheduled for June 21. The king and his party will remain in the Faroe islands from the 24th to the 27th inclusive and are scheduled to arrive in Reykjavik June 30. During the recent visit to Iceland the Iceford will be visited. The king and his party—consisting of a number of riksdag representatives—will return to Copenhagen about July 20.

It is learned from special dispatches that the German emperor intends to meet the Russian czar during a summer trip to Norway. It is expected that political matters of great importance will be discussed. The place of meeting is as yet kept secret.

Prince Gustaf of Denmark, now fully recovered from his illness, returned to Copenhagen two weeks ago and has now regained his usual health and vigor.

Emperor William of Germany and the empress will arrive in Copenhagen July 3, when they will be the guests at the royal palace.
