

GEORGE E. RICE

George E. Rice, the Great Northern station agent at Princeton, was born at Wauceka, Wis., on October 20, 1867. He attended the public schools at that place and in 1880 went to South Dakota, where he spent two years on a farm. Returning to his old home he secured employment in a heading mill and continued to work there until the summer of 1887, when he started to learn telegraphy at St. Anthony Park. In the spring of 1888 Mr. Rice obtained his first position as telegrapher with the Great Northern Railway company and was stationed in an old switch shanty at St. Anthony Park. After being moved around to several points as telegrapher he secured a position as station agent at Clear Lake. From there he was stationed at Menasha, where he remained until 1896, when he contracted gold fever and went to Alaska. Upon his return, in 1897, Mr. Rice was sent to Anoka by the

Great Northern Railroad company to relieve the regular agent who was suffering from a broken leg. On January 21, 1898, Mr. Rice took charge of the Princeton depot and has since remained here.

Thus George E. Rice has been in the employ of the Great Northern Railway company almost continuously for twenty years, ten of which have been devoted to duty in Princeton. During his residence here he has proven himself a valuable official—ever alert to the interests of the company which he represents and accommodating to the public. Mr. Rice has worked hard, in fact he works hard almost every day in the year, but withal he is ever civil and obliging. The more work he has the better natured he seems to be. Princeton is fortunate indeed in having so good a man as Mr. Rice for its station agent.

State News.

One hundred thousand dollars worth of property was destroyed at Deer River on Thursday by fire.

Peter Neilson Mathiasen, the convicted murderer of Johan Johanson, in Beltrami county, will not pay the penalty upon the scaffold, as the state board of pardons has commuted the punishment to life imprisonment in the penitentiary.

Augusta Fahm, the young woman who was arrested a few weeks ago charged with embezzling several thousand dollars from a steamship agency by which she was employed, pleaded guilty to grand larceny in the second degree, when arraigned in the Hennepin district court and was sentenced to one year and four months in the state prison.

The thirtieth annual convention of the Minnesota State Dairyman's association closed at Northfield on Thursday. Robert Crickmore of Owatonna was elected president to succeed L. A. Sweet of Fairmont. W. F. Schilling of Northfield was chosen first vice president; F. D. Currier of Nicollet, second vice president; J. R. Morley of Owatonna, secretary, (re-elected), and James N. Jack of Stanton, treasurer.

Capt. Charles Bradley of Engine Company No. 3, fire department, was run over and instantly killed on Friday at Nicollet avenue and Seventh street, Minneapolis, by a steamer team driven by his close friend, W. W. King. The accident occurred when the streets were crowded with vehicles and the walks thronged with pedestrians. Engine Company No. 3 had answered a call from the Lindley block and Captain Bradley, being the first of his company on the scene, jumped from one rig to be stricken down by the engine which was close behind. Captain Bradley had been a member of the fire department for a quarter of a century.

Detective William Springer of St. Paul on Saturday arrested Paul Davis for implication in the shooting of Patrolman Becker of St. Cloud. Davis is well known to the St. Paul police, and has served seventeen years of his thirty-four years of existence in state prisons and reformatories. In company with Edward Carmody, he was only recently released from the St. Paul workhouse. He has served two terms in Stillwater, one five year term in the Waupun, Wis., penitentiary, and a term in the St. Cloud reformatory. He was seen in company with Car-

mody, Sheehan and Green, drinking in a St. Cloud saloon on the night of the shooting. When taken to St. Cloud he was recognized by Becker as one of his assailants.


