Stroeter Pickling Company Agreement

We, the undersigned, in consideration of Stroeter Pickling Company putting in a salting station at Princeton, Minn., and operating the same for a period of five years, agree to grow and deliver to the Stroeter Pickling Company, at Princeton, Minn., all pickles the product of the number of acres set opposite our respective names. The Stroeter Pickling Company agrees to pay \$1.00 per hundred pounds for all pickles from one and one half inches long to three and one half inches long, 60c per hundred pounds for all pickles from three and one half to four and one half inches long, and 30c per hundred pounds for all pickles from four and one half to five and one half inches long.

The above is the proposition of the Stroeter Pickling Company. It needs no explanation. It is a plain business proposition. No bonus is asked. The company simply wants to be assured that a sufficient acreage of cucumbers will be planted to justify it in building a plant in Princeton at an expenditure of several thousand dollars. If sufficient acreage is guaranteed the company will build a plant here and the farmers will be assured of a market at fair prices for a product of the farm that heretofore was unsaleable. In other words, the farmers of this vicinity can realize from ten to twelve thousand dollars annually for cucumbers—a crop that they have never raised before save in garden patches.

In this connection the following communication has been handed the Union:

"For a long time the business men of Princeton have been alive to the fact that their neighboring towns, namely Isanti, Braham and Clear Lake were enjoying a market for a farm product which had no value in Princeton as there was no concern here that could handle it. That product was green cucumbers.

"Every farmer knows that the cucumber is a prolific vegetable in this soil and climate but he could not raise it as there was positively no sale for

it in his home town. Cucumbers are not like potatoes or cream, they cannot be raised and shipped out of the country fresh but must be cured and salted in the town nearest to the farmers who are growing them.

"Mr. Stroeter of the Stroeter Pickling company addressed the farmers of this locality at the creamery meeting which was held in the opera house here last Saturday and is now desirous of locating a pickling plant at this place. All the conditions that they ask of the farmers are that they grow during the coming season 100 acres of cucumbers and deliver them at the plant in Princeton, which will be built and equipped as soon as the above acreage is pledged by the farmers.

"The pickling company will furnish seed to the farmers at the wholesale price and accept the pay in cucumbers when the crop is delivered.

"If this acreage is secured here this year the company will put up a bond to operate the plant for a period of five years and pay not less than the prices guaranteed in the contracts this year. The Union has printed these contracts at the top of long sheets of paper and any farmer who is interested in getting a market for pickles at Princeton can call at this office and put down his name and the number of acres that he wishes to raise, and he

may also have one of these papers to circulate among his neighbors and friends to help get the required amount of acreage to assure a plant of this kind at Princeton.

"A number of these papers are already being circulated among the farmers and if those who have papers out for that purpose will be present at the creamery meeting next Saturday or, if it is not convenient to be at that meeting, will leave the paper at the First National bank it will be possible to tell what the prospect is for getting the plant located here.

"Mr. Stroeter will again be present at the meeting next Saturday and all those who are interested in the pickle plant should be present and hear what he has to say. It seems to us that this is a golden opportunity for our farmers to add one more good paying farm product to the list and we hope to see a large number of farmers attend this meeting next Saturday.

"The plant of this kind that was established at Foley last year paid the farmers over six thousand dollars in cash for cucumbers and has over twenty-eight carloads of pickles to ship out of that town now.

"Call at this office and get the lists. Sign for what you think you can gather, and then get your friends interested."


