

SUDDEN CHANGE OF FRONT Despite Recent Optimistic Declarations Executive Abandons Extra Session Plan.

St. Paul—(Special)—Of course you have heard the latest—Governor Eberhart's announced abandonment of his promised call of the legislature in special session.
