Telephone Girls' Eyes.

In an article on this subject the Press Bulletin of the American Medical association says that the average term of service of the telephone girl, of whom there are 125,000 in the United States, is three years; that this is due to the effect of the light flashes "resulting in fatigue to the eyes, to say nothing of the mental and physical strain under which the operator constantly works; that the symptoms of eye-strain which the girls develop are headache, dullness, indigestion, exhaustion, nerve strain, insomnia, colds, and so forth. The two or three short years of telephone work possible to the girls, as well as nine-tenths of all their suffering, is probably due to the constant near-range eyework without proper protection for the eyes." The telephone girl's job is no sinecure and a hard one at the best.

Ruling of District Court Affirmed.

The state supreme court has affirmed the ruling of Judge C. A. Nye denying a new trial in the case of Elvira Peterson vs. Dr. A. G. Phelps of Milaca for malpractice. The case came up for trial at the November, 1912, term of the district court at Princeton and the jury awarded plaintiff damages in the sum of \$1,500. This suit grew out of the alleged improper treatment of an ailment to one of the plaintiff's fingers which resulted in permanent injury. Defendant made application for a new trial but this was denied by the trial court. Later an appeal was taken to the supreme court and following is the ruling handed down by that court last Friday:


Elvira Peterson, respondent, vs. A. G. Phelps appellant.

Syllabus: In an action for malpractice where it is alleged that defendant did not use skill and care in diagnosing and treating a felon on plaintiff's finger, and that he did not make the necessary and proper incision in the finger, it is not error to admit testimony of the actual treatment given including the pricking of the finger with a needle.

The verdict in so far as it embodies a conclusion that defendant was guilty of malpractice and that the loss of plaintiff's finger resulted therefrom is amply supported by the evidence, and it must also be held that the evidence sufficiently establishes that plaintiff became a patient of defendant and entitled to receive such treatment as the physician possessed of the ordinary care and skill would give.

There was no abuse of discretion in denying a new trial on the ground of newly discovered evidence, such evidence being cumulative, and directed to collateral matters, and the excuse for its non-production at the trial being weak.

Order affirmed. —Holt, J.
