At present there are over 800 farmers' clubs that are active in the state.

The fire was not discovered at once, and when the alarm was turned in it was practically beyond control. The fire department was soon on the scene with the chemical engine, there being no hydrant in that vicinity. Nothing could be done toward checking the flames, but considerable of the downstairs furniture was saved. The shingles on the Henry Erickson residence, about 15 rods away, became ignited but no damage was done to speak of. The origin of the fire is unknown, but it is presumed to have resulted from a defective chimney as it started upstairs. The loss is partially covered by insurance.


