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ACCUSES NATION OF TREACHERY

Italian Paper Says Montenegro Behaved Falsely.

CHARGES PACT WITH AUSTRIA

Rome Journal Declares Balkan State Agreed Before the Outbreak of the War to Cede Mount Lovcen to the Dual Monarchy.

Rome, Jan. 19.—The charge that Montenegro agreed with Austria, even before the outbreak of the war, to cede Mount Lovcen, and that the defense of the mountain was only sufficient to lull the suspicions of the entente allies, is made by a correspondent of the Idea Nazionale.

"Montenegro allowed the Austrians to take Kuc, which was practically impregnable," says the correspondent, "and when the government retired to Podgoritz, Giukanovitch of the state council and other high officials remained in Cetinje with orders to yield the capital to the Austrians without opposition. Italy recently sent an enormous quantity of provisions to revictual the Montenegrin and Serbian armies, but the provisions were left rotting on the quays at San Giovanni di Medua, Albania, although there were plenty of means for transport to the interior. Instead of repairing the Medua-Scutari road the Montenegrins repaired the Glakava-Scutari road, facilitating the Austrian anti-Serbian operation. The food was not carried into the interior, to induce the population to believe that they were deserted by the allies, and that hence there was necessity for Montenegro joining the Austro-Hungarians.

AUSTRIA IN FULL CONTROL

To Assume Charge of Montenegrin Railways and Municipalities.

Berlin, Jan. 19.—The terms under which Austria consented to the cessation of hostilities pending peace negotiations with Montenegro were announced in Vienna dispatches.

The Montenegrin soldiers decided to lay down their arms and it was agreed that all citizens should come forward in groups and also surrender their arms.

Austrian authorities are to search the whole of Montenegro to prevent the formation of guerrilla bands and all Montenegrin males will be concentrated in certain districts designated by the Austrian authorities.

Austrian authorities are to take over the control of all cities and all means of transportation come under their control.

TO MAINTAIN ITS NEUTRALITY

Swedish King Urges Increase in Army and Navy.

Stockholm, Jan. 19.—King Gustave in an address at the opening session of parliament said that he hoped his government would always maintain its neutrality.

King Gustave also said that in order to maintain this neutrality increased forces on land and sea must be in readiness.

The king called parliament's attention to the alleged "usurpation of power" by belligerents.

He named no one of the belligerents, but in view of reports that England is about to declare a blockade of the entire German coast, thus cutting off trade between Sweden and Germany, the king's remarks were considered most significant.

BRITISH BLOCKADE SUCCESS

Investigator Reports Imports to German Ports Are Decreasing.

London, Jan. 19.—In connection with foodstuffs reaching the central powers through neutral states the British government recently sent a specially qualified business man on a mission to Holland and Scandinavia to investigate whether the legations at the various capitals were doing their work efficiently in supervising agreements and contracts for preventing leakage to Germany.

On his return he reported to the government that everything possible was being done to prevent such leakages.

The blockade since June has been very strict and is ever growing more efficient.

AIR RAID KILLS BULGARS

Hundreds Die and Many Wounded in Attack on Pateritsi.

London, Jan. 19.—Hundreds of Bulgarian soldiers were killed and very many wounded in a bombardment of Pateritsi by a squadron of twenty-five French aeroplanes, according to dispatches received in Athens and forwarded by the correspondent there of the Evening Standard.

Greek Crisis Unconfirmed.

London, Jan. 19.—It is stated at the foreign office that no news has been received confirming the statements from German sources of new developments in Greece and that the reports are believed to be unfounded.

SENORA HUERTA. Widow of Former Mexican Dictator Appeals to Wilson.



Senora Emilia Aguilar de Huerta, widow of Victoriano Huerta, in a telegram sent from El Paso, Tex., personally appealed to President Wilson to stop the "persecution" of her family. The appeal states Huerta died penniless except for what little interests he may have left in Mexico, from which, by President Wilson's assistance, he was expatriated.

SINKING OF PERSIA DENIED BY GERMANS

Washington, Jan. 19.—Secretary Lansing announced that the Berlin foreign office had informed Ambassador Gerard that all German submarines in the Mediterranean have reported and that none was concerned in the destruction of the British liner Persia.

This assurance was a sequel to the memorandum recently presented by the ambassador, promising full satisfaction to the United States if it should be found that a German submarine commander had violated his instructions and sunk the Persia without warning.

It has been generally believed here that if a submarine attacked the Persia, on which at least one American citizen was lost, it was of Austrian nationality.

The state department, considering the testimony of survivors of the tragedy inconclusive on the point of whether the liner was torpedoed or was destroyed by a mine or an internal explosion, is awaiting a final report from Ambassador Penfield at Vienna.

PLAN TAX TO AID SOLDIERS

Patriotic Funds of Saskatchewan May Be Boosted.

Regina, Sask., Jan. 19.—Lieutenant Governor Lake, in his address at the opening of the fifth session of the third legislature, spoke of the possibility of imposing direct taxation in the province to provide money for the patriotic funds.

He also said that it is practically certain women of the province will be given the right to vote.

DISABLED RYNDAM TO PORT IN SAFETY

New York, Jan. 19.—A message, stating that the Transatlantic liner Ryndam had reached Gravesend without further mishap and that its passengers were proceeding to their destination, was received at the offices of the Holland-American line. No further details were given.

Officials of the line said that in the absence of any of the particulars of the accident they believed the reported deaths of three stokers might indicate that an engine cylinder or boiler had blown out.

The fact that the stokers are in the forward part of the steamer also gave rise to the surmise that the Ryndam might have been in a collision.

The Ryndam belongs to the Holland-American line and has been in service for many years between New York and Rotterdam. It is 560 feet long, of 22,070 tons displacement. It has accommodations for 2,936 passengers.

TUSCANIA BRINGS BULLION

Liner Went North of Ireland to Avoid Meeting U-Boat.

New York, Jan. 19.—The liner Tuscania arrived here with a large amount of bullion and American securities, estimated by passengers to be worth several million dollars. Great precaution was taken to prevent the steamship being torpedoed after sailing from Liverpool and the vessel passed north of Ireland, the first steamer to take this course in several months.

BRITISH REPLY SARCASTIC

Official View of German Note on Baralong Case.

London, Jan. 19.—"Some surprise is expressed that the nation whose armed forces have been responsible for the sack of Louvain, the murder of hundreds of unoffending men, women and children on the Lusitania and other ships, the execution of Edith Cavell, the use of poisonous gas, the poisoning of wells, attempted torpedoing of hospital ships and countless other atrocities, should describe their methods of warfare as humane."

The foregoing is taken from a statement of the British official view of the German note regarding the Baralong case. It follows a statement to the effect that Germany has adhered to recognized rules of war and punishes those responsible for any violations.

Brindisi Victims Number 260.

Rome, Jan. 19.—Dr. Edward W. Ryan of the American Red Cross, who arrived here after a trip in Montenegro and Albania, said that 260 persons were drowned by the sinking of the Italian steamship Brindisi, which struck a mine recently in the Adriatic sea. Among those drowned was Miss Hamble, a nurse.

Arnold Morley Dead.

London, Jan. 19.—Arnold Morley, formerly postmaster general, is dead at the age of sixty-seven years. He retired ten years ago after an active political career during which he was singled out by Gladstone for the office of chief party whip.

DERBY BELIEVES PLAN A SUCCESS

Asserts Britain Has Enough Men to Insure Victory.

PEACE MUST BE PERMANENT

British Recruiting Officer Says Military Measures Taken Have Been a Complete Surprise to the Teutons, but Declines to Give Any Definite Figures on Enlistments.

London, Jan. 19.—Lord Derby received a correspondent at the war office and for half an hour discussed the war outlook resulting from the Derby recruiting scheme and the compulsory military service bill, more particularly their effect in assuring the prosecution of the war to successful conclusion.

Asked how many men would come forward under the plan and what the British fighting force in the field would be Lord Derby said:

"It is impossible to make estimates on the numbers of men, for if the Angel Gabriel made an estimate some one would be found in the house of commons to rise and challenge the estimate. But one essential thing is sure—it has been a complete answer to Germany and has shown that we will have enough men to carry forward the war to a successful conclusion."

When Lord Derby was asked what a "successful conclusion" implied he said:

"Answering that might involve laying down terms of peace, such as Germany's getting out of Belgium and France, and so on, which is outside of my province. But certain it is that a successful conclusion of the war means that it will be prosecuted until we have such a peace as will make it perfectly sure that there will be no further war of this kind in our time or in our children's children time. It will be absolutely conclusive and nothing short of that."

The military measures taken by England have been a complete surprise to Germany, he declared, first, in showing the number of men who had come forward, and then, that the country had acquiesced in the measures so thoroughly. Even those who had opposed the measure most bitterly were careful to say that they would obey the law once it was enacted.

"Yes, but the best thing is that they will come back when the country needs them. I get letters daily from all over the world from men eager to pay all their expenses and come back now that the country needs them."

CERTIFICATE OF AMENDMENT OF THE ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF THE MILACA COMPANY.

We, Charles Keith and J. A. "Resolved: That the articles third and seventh of the Articles of Incorporation of the company be amended to read as follows:—

"Article Third." The amount of the capital stock of this corporation shall be seventy-five thousand Dollars (\$75,000) whereof twenty-five thousand Dollars (\$25,000) shall be common stock and fifty thousand Dollars (\$50,000) shall be preferred stock.

The said preferred stock shall be entitled to seven per cent (7%) annual cumulative dividends out of the profits of the corporation, and shall have such other preferences and privileges as the corporation may confer thereon, and shall be free from taxation, redemption and cancellation at such times and on such conditions as the corporation shall fix before the said preferred stock is issued. All of the capital stock of said corporation, common, shall be paid in at such times and in such amounts as shall be prescribed by said Board of Directors. Each shareholder holding the common stock shall entitle him to one vote either in person or by proxy, for each share of common stock held by him.

The holders of the preferred stock shall not be entitled to vote so long as the dividends prescribed for the preferred stock are duly paid out of the net earnings of said company, but whenever for any reason an annual dividend upon said preferred stock is not paid, thereupon each holder of preferred stock shall be entitled to one vote, either in person or by proxy, for each share of preferred stock held by him, and shall so continue to have the right to vote at all of the meetings of the stockholders of said corporation until the payment of dividend upon said preferred stock from the net earnings of said company is resumed.

"Article Seventh." The number of shares of the capital stock of said corporation shall be two hundred fifty (250) shares of common stock and five hundred (500) shares of preferred stock, and the amount of each share shall be One Hundred Dollars (\$100).
