County Commissioner Cater is giving his personal attention to this road and he proposes to put it in the best possible shape that the means at his disposal will permit of, and he says if he could obtain about 20 cars of crushed rock he would have a dandy road, but it is altogether probable that clay gravel will be the only surfacing material obtainable.

Keith and Bryson and Mayor Newbert with reference to furnishing Princeton with electricity from the Elk River plant. Mr. Waterman says his plant has power to furnish several towns with electricity. If matters can be arranged he will shortly be prepared to make a definite proposition that he thinks would prove mutually satisfactory to his company and Princeton.

A special meeting of the commercial club was held at the office of McMillan & Stanley Friday evening to discuss plans for meeting the Duluth boosters, who will be here during the noon hour tomorrow. 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
