

FOR STATE DEVELOPMENT and GOVERNMENT BY THE PEOPLE VOTE FOR INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM AMENDMENT No. 7

ORDINANCE NO. 100. AN ORDINANCE TO LICENSE, REGULATE AND RESTRAIN THE EXHIBITION OF SHOWS, PERFORMANCES, THEATERS, CIRCUSES, SALES, OR INDIAN MEDICINE SHOWS, WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE VILLAGE OF PRINCETON, MINNESOTA.

The Village Council of Princeton, Minnesota, do ordain as follows: Section 1.—It shall be unlawful for any person, persons or corporation to make or exhibit any show, theater, circus, sale, performance or Indian medicine show within the corporate limits of the village of Princeton, Minnesota, without first having obtained a license therefor under the authority of the common council of said village.

Section 2.—Any person, persons or corporation wishing to make or exhibit any show, theater, circus, sale, performance or Indian medicine show within the village of Princeton, shall first obtain license therefor by making application, in writing, therein setting out the time and place when and where such exhibition is to take place, and filing said application with the Mayor of said Village, which application shall be by him presented to the common council of said village.

Section 3.—The fee for such license shall be, ten dollars (\$10) per day if such show, etc., be exhibited in a hall, opera house or other building; twenty-five dollars (\$25) per day if such show, etc., be exhibited in a tent and any circus having a one-ring-show, shall pay from twenty-five (\$25) dollars to fifty (\$50) dollars per day for each and every day of such exhibition; provided further that in case of applications for moving picture shows such application may be made to cover a period of one year and in such case the license shall be issued for such period, in the same manner and subject to the provisions as set out in section 2 of this ordinance, and the fee for such license shall be \$200.

Section 4.—Any person, persons or corporation offending against the provisions of this ordinance shall be, upon conviction thereof, punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five (\$25) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100) or by imprisonment for not exceeding ninety (90) days.

Section 5.—All ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed. Section 6.—This ordinance shall take effect from and after the passage and approval thereof. Dated October 30, 1916. Passed and approved this 30th day of October, 1916. H. NEWBERT, President. CLIFTON CRAVENS, Recorder.
