### PRaises Wilson's Action

Herbert C. Hoover Mentions Conditions in Belgium.

London, April 4.—Herbert C. Hoover, chairman of the American commission for relief in Belgium, sent the following cablegram to President Wilson:

"The members of the American commission for relief in Belgium wish to tell you that there is no word in your historic statements to congress that does not find a response in all our hearts.

"For two and a half years we have been obliged to remain silent witnesses of the character of the forces dominating this war, but we are now at liberty to say that, although we break with great regret our association with many German individuals, yet your message enunciates our conviction, born of our intimate experience and contact, that there is no hope for democracy or liberalism, and consequently for the real peace and safety of our country, unless the system which brought the world into this unfathomable misery can be stamped out once for all."
